CLUB LEADERS TO ATTEND MEETING AT UNION STATION

The local leaders of Malheur County 4-H Crops and Livestock Clubs are planning to attend a conference for all Eastern Oregon leaders of these types of clubs to be held at the Union Experiment Station on Friday and Saturday, May 22 and 23.

This conference is being held to give the local leaders some training in various phases of club work, particularly training in carrying on 4-H Club demonstrations in developing livestock and crop judging teams within their Club and to discuss Club organization methods.

H. C. Seymour, State Club Leader, will be in charge of the meeting and has arranged a very worthwhile program which includes discussion of crops and livestock subject matter material, some actual judging work, and discussion of preparing different types of animals for show ring. Other topics to be discussed include record keeping, methods of conducting meetings, preparing exhibits, and a general discussion on any topics that the leaders may want to bring up pertaining to Club activities.

The program is scheduled to start at 9:30 A. M. Friday 22, and continue throughout the day, with a round table discussion around the campfire in the evening. On the

second day of the conference the leaders present will make a tour of the Union Experiment Station observing the work being done there in livestock and crop experiments, and the session will close early in the afternoon so leaders living at a distance may reach home that night.

EASTERN OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL SUMMER SESSION WILL GIVE 3rd TERM WORK

Announcements of the Eastern Oregon Normal School summer session indicate that this institution will this summer for the first time offer third year work. The 1935 legislature extended the normal school curriculum to a full three years by 1941, one term being added each biennium. In accordance with this action, the first term of third year work will be provided during the 1936 summer session and thereafter. Students now completing their Freshmen year are planning on enrolling for the summer term in order that they may complete their seven terms, and thus be enabled to begin teaching at the end of two calendar years. In addition, it is expected that many graduates of the two-year curriculum will return to the Eastern Oregon Normal School for advanced work, either to keep pace with advancing professional standards, or to work toward the bachelors' degree.

Numerous inquiries have also been received relative to the Nature Study excursion into the Wallowa Mountains. Many Widwestern teachers, who plan to attend the National Education Association convention in Portland have expressed interest in this subject.
