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Many 4-H Club Members To Attend Summer School

Advance reports from the different communities that are carrying on 4-H Club work indicate a considerable increase in the number of scholarships to the annual 4-H Club summer school at Corvallis that are being awarded to outstanding 4-H Club members this year. Indications at present point to approximately thirty Club members from Malheur County who will be attending summer school on scholarships given by various organizations to those whose records of achievement in their Club project entitle them to this award.

A chance to attend this summer school is one of the high lights in a Club member's career inasmuch as it gives him an opportunity to attend classes dealing with the various lines of work that he carries in his Club projects, these classes being taught by college professors, and also gives an opportunity to come in contact with other 4-H Club members from all over the State. From past experience it is found that the two weeks session gives the club members a much broader view point, as the trip permits him to find out things that are going on outside of his own particular community.

The cost of attending this summer school is kept at a minimum in order to permit as many as possible to take advantage of the opportunities offered. Tuition, board and room which includes all the necessary expense while at the session, is twelve dollars for the two weeks. The railroad also offers special round trip fares for 4-H Club members and leaders, the cost from Malheur County being seven dollars and sixty cents.

While most of the delegates from Malheur County will be attending on scholarships offered by various organizations, a few Club members who have attended this summer school in the past are planning to go again this year by paying their own way. Local leaders of 4-H Clubs are also eligible to the same rates as apply to Club members, and at least three Club members from this County have already expressed their intention to attend the session.

Among the organizations giving scholarships this year are the Wild Rose Grange, Eldorado Grange, Oregon Slope Grange, Vale Grange, Annex P. T. A., Oregon Trail P. T. A., Kingman Colony P. T. A., Wade P. T. A., Big Bend P. T. A., and Jordan Valley P. T. A. The Malheur County Fair Board is also awarding four scholarship for outstanding exhibits at the County Fair last fall. Another scholarship was won by Alvin Duvall by taking 1st in the corn exhibit at the State Fair. The Ironside Health Club raised money for two scholarships for members of their organization. The Ontario Commercial Club is awarding four scholarships to the outstanding club members in the County in livestock, crops, clothing and cooking projects and the Ontario Lions Club is awarding two scholarship to club members in the Ontario community.

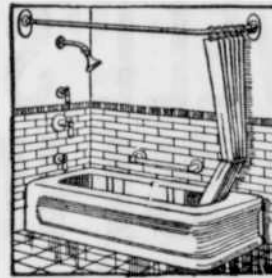

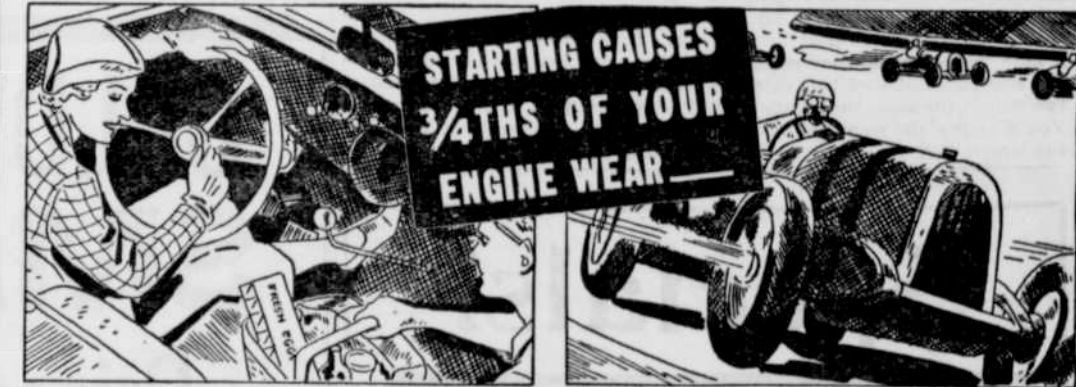


Arthur Brisbane editorially said on May 16, 1935—
