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## Calves Make Good Gains In 4-H Club Work—Average Gain 70lbs.

Baby beef calves being fed this year by 4-H Club members are showing very good average gains. All the calves now on feed were weighed the early part of the week for the second time this season and the gains ran from about fifty to a hundred and two pounds for the period, April 29th to May 26th, with the average gain around seventy pounds.

Weightings were made this year by means of the trailer scales which were donated to Eastern Oregon Club members last year by the Congress Hotel of Portland. These scales travel throughout the Eastern Oregon counties and this year make the rounds about once every six weeks. These periodical weightings are extremely helpful in giving the club members a chance to check the gains their animals are making.

Club members carrying the baby beef project are Lester and Bud Panke of Annex, Dick Yundt of Oregon Slope, Glen Downs, Bob Alexander, and Walter May of Ontario, Lawrence and Bill Peutz and Raymond Morfitt of Owyhee, and Merle and Bill Kurtz, Leonard Nichols, and Alvin Duvall of Kingman Colony, and Ernest Abble and Morris Godwin of Big Bend.

There are eighteen calves on feed as Dick Yundt is feeding both a senior and a junior Hereford, Leonard Nichols is feeding a Hereford and an Angus, and Alvin Duvall is feeding a Angus and a Shorthorn.

The Ontario Branch of the U. S. National Bank is again sponsoring this project and has assisted the boys in financing the purchase of their animals. To further encourage the members and to offer some incentive for doing their very best work, the Bank has also offered a scholarship to the annual 4-H Club summer school at Corvallis for 1937, to the member who carries his baby beef project through in the best shape, the scholarship to be awarded on the basis of size of project, economical gains, condition of animal when finished, quality of animal, as well as participation and activities in fitting and showmanship contests, in judging contests and exhibits made at County and State Fairs.
