WORK SHEETS ON NEW AG PROGRAM COMING IN SLOW

Work sheets on the new Agricultural Conservation Program have been coming in rather slow, according to County Agent Ray Larson, who urges the growers to perform this duty. A great many farmers do not realize that they can benefit from this program and receive very substantial payments from very small shifts in their farm program. In a great many cases no shift at all is necessary, the farm program already meeting the requirements of this conservation plan.

Under this program, no contract is signed and no agreement is made to do anything which will be at all binding on the farmer and which will in any way constitute a penalty other than the loss of the payment in case no shift in acreage is made or no soil building practice is employed.

Recent rulings of the federal administration has made the program even more favorable to Malheur county growers and the work sheet should be filled out and filed with the County committee in the county agents' office in Ontario. After the work sheets are all in and checked over, applications for the payment will be mailed out at some later date. According to the County Agent's office, there should be very few in this County who will not be eligible for a payment of some sort. The principal ones who may not be eligible are those who are farming new lands for the first time in 1936, and those who have materially increased their acreage of soil depleting crops.

In many cases the payments are expected to be small, but if the farming practice is such as to earn a payment, there is no reason why application for payment should not be made by Nyssa farmers.

WORK STARTED CHECKING HOMESTEAD APPLICATIONS

Work has started checking over the applications for homestead lands in the 107 farm units recently opened by the government. Up to date there has been 55 applications, and after their standing has been checked over, they can file on the land and start making a home. It is expected that it will take from ten days to probably two weeks before any of the successful homesteaders will be able to go on their land.
