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MORE FARMERS BORROW FUNDS ON CO-OP PLAN

More farmers in Baker, Union, Malheur, Grant and Harney counties than ever before are financing their seasonal operations cooperatively on a cash business basis by obtaining loans through the Baker Production Credit Association at Baker, Secretary-Treasurer T. G. Montgomery announces.

"Our association has made good growth in both membership and volume of commitment," Mr. Montgomery says, "representing normal expansion based on the money-saving advantages of our cooperative service to stockholding borrowers."

Production Credit Associations throughout the northwest district and the country as a whole have similarly made substantial gains, according to word received by Mr. Montgomery. Through this cooperative means, many farmers are financing their crops and are purchasing farm supplies and machinery for cash this spring for the first time since before the depression.

The ability of more farmers to obtain PCA loans this year is regarded as one of the best indications of improved farm conditions because the loans are made only on a sound business basis adequately secured and budgeted to insure repayment out of farming proceeds.

Due to favorable conditions in the nation's money market, the Baker PCA is still able to borrow from the Intermediate Credit Bank of Spokane at favorable "wholesale" cost, enabling it to make crop, livestock and general purpose loans to its members on a 5 per cent interest basis again this year.

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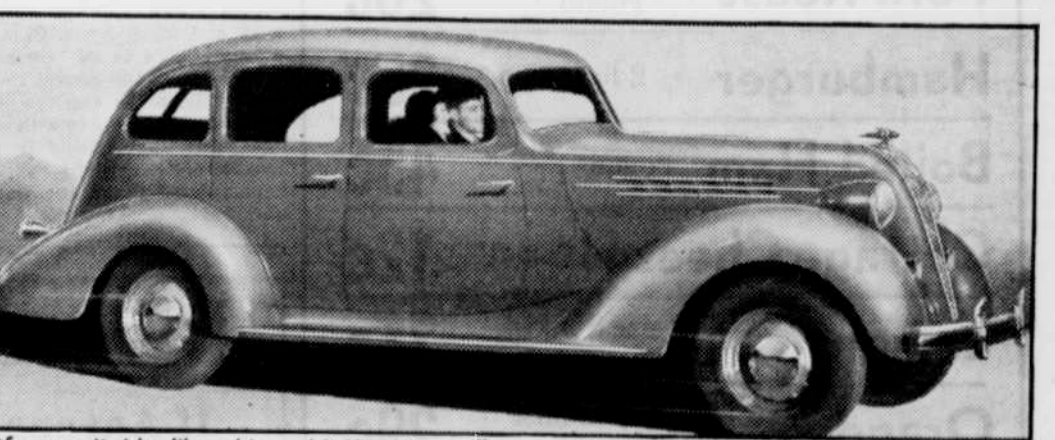
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
