Nyssa is going further than merely housing our guests. The Commercial Club is arranging an entertainment for Tuesday night, along with a banquet, and folks here should make arrangements to attend this meeting and banquet to extend the right hand of fellowship to these prospective neighbors.

Nyssa must go one step further. There people are coming here to see the project and transportation will have to be arranged. No doubt there will be many people in Nyssa who will be willing to take their car and fill it with these excursionists for the caravan trip over the project, to the dam, and other points they will be interested in. Bernard Frost has been appointed to be in charge of arranging transportation and those who are willing to take time off and furnish a car for this worthy purpose, are asked to leave their names with Mr. Frost.

Frederick Steiwer, senator from Oregon and keynote speaker of the Republican National Convention in session at Cleveland this week, struck a responsive chord over the radio Tuesday night.
