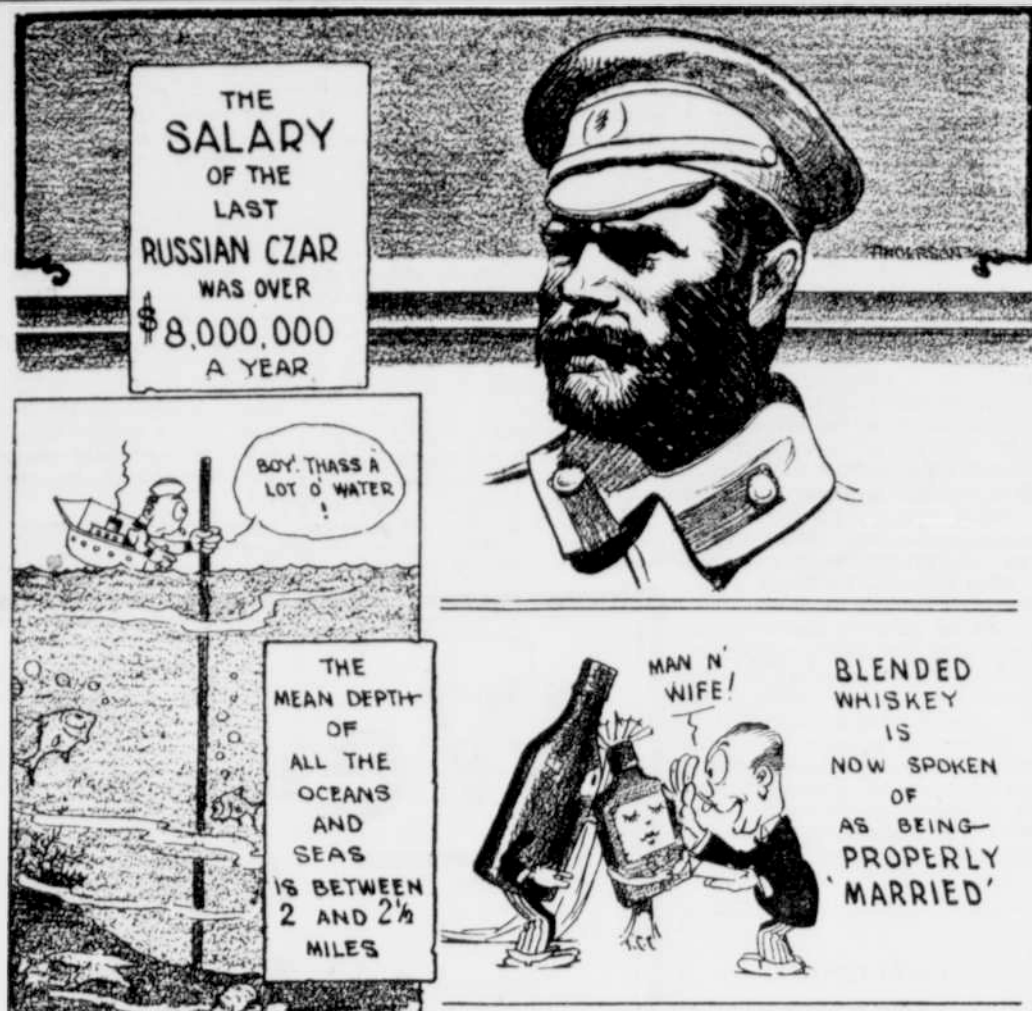

WANT ADS PAY BIG DIVIDENDS

Oregon Mayors and Judges Prefer Work To Dole System

Portland—Many helpful suggestions have come from a general canvass of the mayors and county judges throughout the state of Oregon, according to an announcement made by E. J. Griffith, Works Progress Administrator, to determine their views as to the best method of continuing the work of caring for the unemployed.

In the answers received in reply to the three specific questions contained in the questionnaire, "Is work the proper method for meeting the unemployment problem as compared to the dole and idleness?" "Are we doing useful and needed work under the PWA program?" and "Is there useful work yet to be done under a continued WPA program?" the sentiment was overwhelmingly in the affirmative.

In some cases suggestions were offered that longer hours of work should be demanded; that higher rates of pay should be granted and that employment be offered to unemployed who have not so far been forced to accept direct charity.

Some replies raised the question as to whether or not the creation of jobs tends to deaden a person's initiative and suggested the desirability of revising the program so that there would be a greater incentive for people to attempt to find private employment for themselves.

In no case was the work actually being carried out criticized but, on the contrary, it was all considered to be necessary and useful, although in some instances it was suggested that notwithstanding its need and usefulness, it might have, under normal circumstances, been postponed until such time as its costs could have been provided by direct local taxation.

Following are excerpts taken from the replies received to the questionnaire:

"My experience with relief and relief problems during the last three years has impressed me with this one thought, that a vast majority of those on the unemployment rolls are desirous of obtaining work, rather than to receive the dole or direct relief, and be idle in the meantime.

"From my viewpoint, the Works Progress Administration is doing a most useful and needed work. As a matter of fact, the program as outlined by this county was absolutely a program that we ourselves would do if tax collections would make it possible to do so.

"We are seriously in hopes that the Works Progress Administration may be continued as we have several projects uncompleted which we desire completed under this continuation."

"The unemployed people working on our projects are some of the best citizens in our community, and a dole and idleness would be obnoxious to them. We feel that the

WPA program should be continued." "I do not believe that any of the unemployed men in our community would want the dole system. What they want is work at a living wage and work on projects that are worthy, permanent and for the betterment of living conditions in the community."

TERTELING GETS CANAL CONTRACT AT YAKIMA

Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes today announced award of the contract for construction of a five-mile section of the Yakima Ridge Canal to J. A. Terteling and Sons of Boise, Idaho, on their bid of \$275,213.50.

The bid was the lowest of eight submitted and opened April 13 at the Yakima, Washington, office of the Bureau of Reclamation. The canal will serve the new Roza division of the Yakima Federal Reclamation project. This is the second contract to be let in connection with construction of the Roza division. The first, covering the drilling of three tunnels on the Yakima Ridge Canal, was awarded several months ago.

The canal will range in size from a bottom width of 55 feet to a bottom width of 14 feet. Of the 26,381.5 feet to be constructed under this contract, a total of 11,157 feet will be lined with concrete.

Work must begin under the contract within 30 days and the contractor has 359 calendar days in which to complete the job.

BIDS TO BE OPENED

Bids on two more contracts on the Owyhee project will be opened at Ontario in the near future. Both are for construction of structures in the Dead Ox Flat division of the Owyhee project; bids on one of the contracts to be opened June 17th; the other on the 19th.
