

Start Compiling History Of Malheur County

Vale, June 1—Field work for the historical records survey, WPA federal writers' project, has been started in Malheur county by Miss Margaret Macdonald, of Portland. The purpose of this nationwide undertaking is to collect information for a comprehensive index of the basic materials for research in the history of the United States. Results of the survey in Malheur County and every other county of Oregon will be included in a separate index, which is to be published by the University of Oregon Press.

Miss Macdonald is beginning her work among the archives in the court house. After inventorying other public records, she will undertake an extensive survey of privately owned historical materials.

Alfred Powers, dean of the general extension division of the state system of higher education and director of federal writing in Oregon, urges all persons who own or know of historically interesting old letters, diaries, ledgers, photographs, newspapers, articles of early furniture, etc., to report such items either to Miss Macdonald at Vale, or to the historical record survey, Bedell Building, Portland.

The survey does not contemplate the removal of any relic from its present location or owner. Its purpose is merely to record what the item is and in whose possession.

It is hoped that residents of Malheur county will cooperate with Miss Macdonald to the fullest possible extent. She is doing work of high importance to this section, both for present and future generations.

MINING CLAIM RACKET STOPPED IN PORTLAND

The Portland Police and Better Business Bureau uncovered a new racket last week when they apprehended a self-styled "mining engineer" who was attempting to induce Portlanders to advance small amounts of money to him for the alleged purpose of filing mining claims in Southern Oregon.

This individual, operating under an assortment of aliases, contacted a number of "prospects" with a sales talk in which he claimed to be an engineer representing large mining interests. He asserted he had discovered a number of mining claims in the Southern Oregon region and if these were filed on by outsiders the mining companies would be forced to purchase the rights from the claim holders at exorbitant prices. As an employee of the companies he could not file in his own name, he said, but offered to do so for any who would advance a specified fee.

When complaints reached the Better Business Bureau, detectives were called and the promoter was found registered under an assumed name in a small hotel. After questioning he admitted a police record in other west coast cities and was unable to furnish credentials to support his claim in affiliation with operating mining companies. No formal complaint was placed against the party when he made restitution to known "investors," but the Portland Better Business Bureau warns other communities to be on the lookout for any similar scheme that may be attempted in the state.
