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PWA A GROWING YOUNGSTER ON THIRD BIRTHDAY TUESDAY—

TUESDAY, June 16th was the third birthday anniversary of the Public Works Administration. It was on June 16, 1933 that the Federal Emergency Administration was created by an Act of Congress, as one of the bodies which would assist in the unemployment relief and carry the war against depression right into the front line trenches. The legislation was framed at a time when there were no Republicans nor Democrats, practically speaking; but the legislators were all American citizens bringing together the best brains of both parties to frame a course of action that would bring results.

C. C. Hockley, state director, says "It is easy to announce in round numbers that our co-operative accomplishments have been the construction of 60 schools, many water and sewer systems, the Five Coast Bridges, the expenditure of \$18,000,000, and the employment of 7,000 Oregonians directly on the work; but this is only part of the result."

The rest of the picture is even brighter. Think of the benefit hundreds of pupils will receive from the 60 new school buildings! Sewer facilities were secured by many communities, Nyssa among them; that will bring benefits for over 50 years to come and many water systems constructed that will bring lasting benefits.

While 7,000 Oregonians receive part or all of their livelihood from the co-operative effort of Public Works Administration and the public bodies; the workshops, the furniture factories, the cement mills, and many other industries have employed at least two, and probably three, men for every one directly employed on the work.

It is estimated that the PWA has directly or indirectly given employment to at least 20,000 wage earners in our own state.

As evidence of the value of the program is the fact that skilled labor throughout our state is almost completely employed and the problem is to maintain this condition while at the same time to relieve those not of the skilled trades whose circumstances have forced them upon the relief rolls through no fault of their own.

The PWA has reason to feel pride in its accomplishment during its three years history and no doubt if there is a change in administration this fall, this worthwhile function of the federal government will be continued. No specific mention of PWA is made in the Republican platform, which is taken by some as an indication that the GOP is leaving the way clear to continue the program if they are successful this fall.
