Lines of benefit to the nation, in contrast with the negative policy of paying farmers not to produce crops of which we have a surplus.

"The country consumes about six million tons of sugar annually. Only about one fourth of it is produced within the United States, from both cane and beets.

"Now, consider for a moment the sugar beet from the farmers point of view. During the five-year period from 1930 to 1934, the largest beet-sugar company in the country paid farmers an average price of \$5.92 per ton. A farmer who raised 15-ton crops consistently, therefore, received an average cash return of approximately \$88 per acre, and even the farmer who raised only the country's average of 9.6 tons, received better than \$56 in cash per acre. There are not many large-acreage crops on which a gross yield of \$88 or more to the acre may be expected.

"But the sugar beet is not a plant that can be put in the ground and forgotten. It needs expert attention. The per-acre labor cost is high. Hand labor alone in beet fields, for a season, usually runs close to \$20 per acre, sometimes more.

"The result is that there are few crops raised on a large scale requiring an equal amount of agricultural employment. The employed, both farmers and hired labor, are paid by American standards; and they are all consumers. And producers, employed at American wages in American sugar fields, make an American market for American goods of far greater consequences in American prosperity than foreign labor employed too often at lion-cloth wages.

"It is no happenstance that in areas where beets have been grown longest, a large percentage of the farm homes have more modern conveniences and are attractively landscaped and painted. Because success with this crops calls for intelligence and good management, beets tend to make better farmers of the farmers who grow them. Because of thorough

cultivation and other farm practices required, they tend to improve soil conditions where they are grown. Beets are not a one-crop routine, but fit into a farm-enriching rotation cycle. In a survey taken from 500 farms all over the beet area, it was shown that whereas before beets were introduced into the crop cycle, the yield of wheat was 29.98 bushels per acre, the yield afterward was increased to 44.9 bushels; and the yields of other crops were similarly increased.

"Cattle feeding has become a major project in many sugar-beet areas, and about one third of the lambs winter fattened in the United States are fed in beet-growing territories in the inter-mountain area. The by-products of sugar production, particularly the beet tops and the pulp left from the crushed beet, are a very important feed crop in addition to the cash crop. By restoring the manure to the fields, and practicing a satisfactory rotation, there is an air-tight cycle by which the soil become better and better.

The manufacture of beets into sugar brings additional benefits to the community and nation in the number of persons employed and wealth created.

"In short, then, the raising of sugar beets makes for a high-type, prosperous agriculture, with a great deal of buying power distributed

among a large number of consumers.

Beet Growing Brings Profit To Farmers

An article in the current "Country Home" magazine throws the spotlight of publicity on Scottsbluff, Neb., in western Nebraska, a great sugar-beet production section. The writer of the article says, "I stopped for a few days in Scottsbluff. It is completely modern, thriving, busy city with railroads and paved highways, and a great buying power developed largely because an American farm industry, employing American standards, has been able to sell in American markets.

"On a short walk up main street I saw \$25 crystal-glass candlesticks on display in a store window. The manager of the local unit of a well-known chain stores told about stocking a line of \$15 blankets. An automobile dealer told about 495 carloads of automobiles shipped into the valley in one year. Two railroad men gave me details concerning the increased volume of freight traffic as of 1900 (before Scottsbluff farmers grew sugar beets) and in 1930 after it had become increasingly important. In the former year there were 283 incoming carloads; in the latter year, 7,171."

"Sugar beets are raised in important quantities in sixteen states, mostly in the North and West, and mostly in irrigated areas. Colorado is the leading beet-sugar state, with California in a close second, and Michigan, Montana, Wyoming, Nebraska, Idaho, Utah and others following closely in order. Wherever sugar beets are grown, there develops a high type of diversified agriculture. Farmsteads take on a prosperous look. Farmers have cash to spend. The land gives employment to a greatly increased number of people. Distant sections of the country prosper, as they always do when an important portion of the population prospers. The sugar beet, in a word, is an outstanding illustration of advantages to be expected from a positive policy of encouraging agricultural production along

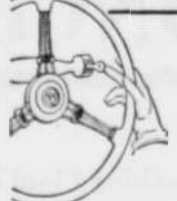
