VALE CONCERNS BID
LOW FOR DIVERSION
DAM AT ASHTON, IDAHO

Otis Williams company and Brant-Sturgill company of Vale submitting a joint bid, were low for the contract of building the diversion dam on the north fork of the Snake river near Chester, Idaho, according to announcement made this week.

A total of 12 bids were received on contract. The Vale companies offered a total bid of \$124,540.75 for the two schedules, number one on construction of the diversion dam and number two the building of the cross cut canal.

John Klug and Joe Brumbach were next low on schedule one at \$74,703.25 and Bernard-Curtis company of Minneapolis were second low on schedule two at \$70,885. The bids have been sent to the Denver reclamation office for approval and awarding of the contract, which will go to the low bidders if they qualify.
