Wedding Gowns of Many Periods Shown Friday Night

The Wedding Gown Parade entertainment was a success from every view point and very much enjoyed by the crowd. The program was opened by music furnished by Mrs. W. C. Jackson at the piano and Mrs. Herbert Fisher on the violin. They played "Melody of Love" by Schubert and "I Love You Truly," by Bond. Mrs. J. W. Poage presented an exhibit of beautiful shawls and kimonoes, from other countries. One of black silk was made in Hawaii by the grandmother of Hinemoa Cloninger and another, owned by Miss Thelma Leuck came from China. Miss Alice Hashitani sang "At Dawning" by Cadman, accompanied by Mrs. Jackson.

Mrs. Jackson played wedding marches from Lohengrin and Mendelssohn while the brides marched in and stood at the back of the platform. The church was beautifully

decorated with flowers and an arch under which each bride stood while she was announced. Mrs. Poage first announced Mrs. W. W. Foster who was married in Olympia, Colorado in 1912 and came to Nyssa as a bride. She wore her own wedding dress of white embroidery. Mrs. Foster then announced the others who came forward in order of their dates, the oldest ones first. Many interesting comparisons were made as the treasured gowns of the different times were viewed. The gowns of 1870 to 1894 were nearly all dark, of heavy material, lined throughout, stayed and boned. The dresses of the first twenty years of the twentieth century were all white, the earlier ones being of cotton, India linen, flaxen, organdie, and the latter ones of silk. The more modern dresses were mostly of sheer and filmy laces and silks, though some were heavier silk. Twenty-five dresses were displayed and all were white, cream or ivory except eight. The length ranged from the long sweeping train to the knee length dress of 1927.

The oldest wedding gown shown was worn by Mrs. Max Gilchrist. It was of heavy purple changeable silk, made with a basque with fringe over the shoulders and a long, full skirt. It is a keepsake in the family of W. H. Goldsmith of New Plymouth and was worn by his great aunt at the time of her marriage in 1870. The second oldest was also from the Goldsmiths, and was worn by his mother in 1833. It was displayed by Miss Irene Poage. Mrs. Fred Marshall's beautiful wedding dress of dark wine silk and velvet with a bodice, full skirt and a jacket. She was married in 1883 and Marion Harris displayed the gown. Mrs. McDonald, mother of Douglas McDonald was married in 1889 in Ontario, Canada. Her dress of dark lavender striped silk was worn by Mrs. Malcolm Crawford. The large bustle of this dress made everyone laugh. Mrs. R. J. Davis was married at Pikeville, Tenn., in 1894. Her dress worn by Mrs. Emil Paulus was of tan wool, trimmed in lavender velvet.

After the entertainment all enjoyed a pleasant social hour in the cool basement, which was decorated in pink and white. Carrying out the color scheme, ice cream and cake in generous amounts were served.
