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SPORTSMEN RECOMMEND

CHANGE IN PHEASANT SEASON—

THE Nyssa Wild-Life League met Thursday evening and acted on several resolutions, which are to be presented at the meeting of the Oregon Game Commission meeting today.

The League went on record as favoring the continuation of the deer season just as it is now, which means no shooting of does and opening date on September 20th and running until October 25. The League recommended that the grouse season in Malheur county open and close the same as Baker county and that the Hungarian Partridge season open August 15th and close October 15th.

In the matter of Chinese pheasants, it was suggested that the season open on October 15th and close November 30th and that shooting be allowed only two or three days in the week, and closed the other days of the week. It was suggested that Wednesdays and Sundays be included and any other days the Commission saw fit. The League also recommended that the bag limit be set at four birds per day.

Of course the Nyssa Wild Life League has no official standing and the Commission may see fit to totally ignore the suggestions offered. They were merely presented as expressing the sentiment of sportsmen here; the resolutions being drawn up at an open meeting of the League at which time everyone had an opportunity to express their views on the subject.

Some lovers of the outdoors, particularly fishermen, would like to see more fish brought into the waters here. Some fish have been planted here, but some of the districts in the western part of the state have asked for from 70 per cent up to 100 per cent of the hatchery output; and many local sportsmen feel that after all, Malheur, Harney, Grant, Baker, Union and other eastern counties are still part of Oregon.

There has also been considerable discussion as to what is to become of the Dunaway bass pond. The dams were put in place way last spring and the water raised high enough to wash a hole in one of them. Plans and specifications for a spillway have been presented, but up to date the only constructive effort made was the placing of the dams by some of our local sportsmen in co-operation with reclamation contractors. Bass should be planted in the pond in a very short time now, and if the worst comes, a party may have to be organized for some evening to go out and put in a head-gate; which after all is the total amount of construction necessary now that the dams are in place.

ANOTHER IRRIGATION PROJECT ABOUT TO BE STARTED IN IDAHO—

PEOPLE all over Southern Idaho and Eastern Oregon read with special delight this week a story in the daily press about the proposed reclaiming of 680,000 acres of farm land between Boise and Twin Falls. This is now in sagebrush, but is said that most of the land is deep and rich. The scheme is to bring water from Blue Lakes, near Twin Falls, by gravity, and water this vast inland empire.

There will be some who will attempt to knock this big undertaking and say the country doesn't need more land. You've heard that argument yourself. Anyone who can read, has read in the past two weeks about the searing heat which is tearing the vitals from the mid-west again this year, and laying additional thousands of acres in ruins. What is going to happen to this land? Can the farmers keep bucking against a stone wall in the faint hope that conditions will improve? Human endurance can stand just so much, and then these families are coming west—and in fast increasing numbers.

At the Kansas picnic last Sunday it developed that there were over 40 people from the same town in Kansas present at the picnic. The first one from the town came to Nyssa a year ago. Not one wants to go back to Kansas to live. It means the west in going to see the biggest migration in history and families by the thousands will settle on the rich, irrigated lands of the west, where crops are certain, climate unexcelled and life is really worth living.
