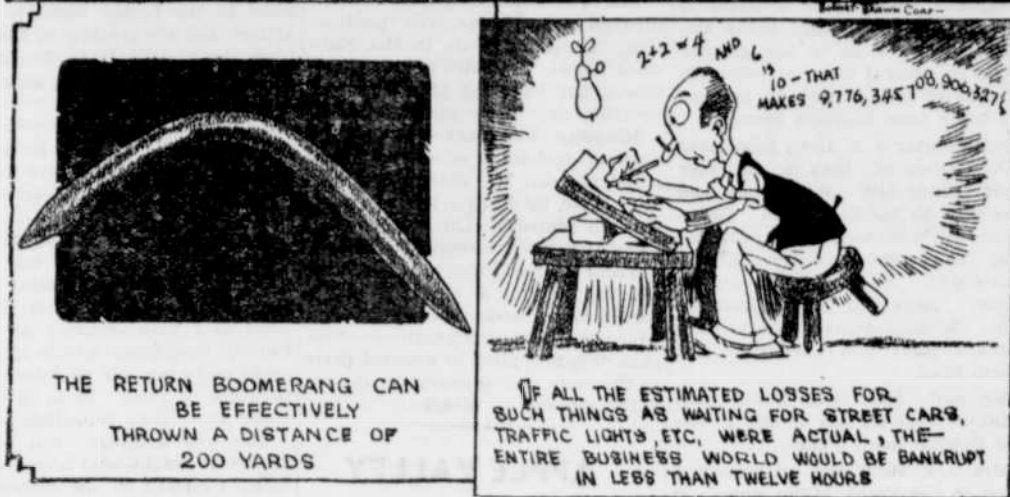
Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Welsh attended the funeral of Dr. Boone in Caldwell Sunday.

OREGON TERRITORY CENTENNIAL POSTAGE STAMPS ANNOUNCED

Postmaster Goshert has received a supply of the new Oregon Territory centennial commemorative stamps, the first ever issued by the United States honoring this part of the country.

The new stamp is the same size as the current special delivery stamp, arranged horizontally and printed in purple ink. The central design is an outline map of the old Oregon Territory, which today comprises the states of Idaho, Oregon and Washington and portions of Montana and Wyoming. On this map is depicted the famous old Oregon Trail.

The Post office department is issuing this new stamp in conjunction with the observance this summer of the Centennial Anniversary of the arrival of the first white families in the old Oregon territory, which now comprises one-seventh of the total United States. They were the families of Rev. Henry L. Spaulding and Dr. Marcus Whitman. Rev. Spaulding was accompanied by his wife, Eliza Hart Spaulding and Dr. Whitman by his wife, Narcissus Whitman.

It was the heroic pioneering efforts and outstanding missionary work of these two families that brought about the great influx of immigration to this vast area, which 100 years later, remains the nation's greatest asset in undeveloped resources.

Bureau Warns Against New Lottery Racket

Although it is quite generally known that all lottery tickets are illegal in this country, many otherwise law-abiding citizens buy them with the hope of becoming rich overnight, the Portland Better Business Bureau reports. Most of these lottery promotions, however, are merely rackets and no drawing is held.

Recent investigations by the Montreal Better Business Bureau indicate that promoters in Canada have started "sweeps" and after a large quantity of tickets are sold, the organizers themselves tip off the police. In due course the premises are occupied and raided and a small quantity of tickets, literature, etc., left as "window dressing" are seized. Subsequently a "front" for the organizers will appear before the court, admit his guilt and pay a nominal fine. Later when purchasers of tickets inquire regarding the draw, they are told that no drawing is possible due to the seizure of the records by police.

Hundreds of thousands of counterfeit tickets in sweepstakes operated legally in foreign countries have also been sold in the United States, the bureau reports. Postal authorities in the United States and Canada have instituted a plan to curb illegal sweepstakes. In one month last year the United States government issued 450 fraud orders on lottery and sweepstakes promotions originating in Canada, Cuba, Bermuda, Mexico, France and other countries.
