## SUMMER CAMPING HINTS

The United States Forest service, through a recent popular publication, "Camping Hints in the National Forest," includes among many others, the following ideas to make vacation days more pleasant:

**Mosquito Repellent**—One of the simplest and most effective insect repellents can be obtained at any drug store by having the following formula prepared: Oil of citronella, 1 part; spirits of camphor, 1 part; oil of cedar,  $\frac{1}{2}$  part, and "a little" olive oil. The amount of olive oil can be varied, more being used for persons who have an exceptionally sensitive skin. When applied to exposed parts of the body, this preparation greatly reduces mosquito attacks.

Ontario Bank  
To Modernize

Extensive improvements are being planned for the Ontario Branch of the United States National Bank, according to an announcement issued by Mr. Joe F. Dyer, manager. "Plans call for an expenditure of some \$25,000 and include a new addition to the building, largely increasing its size and capacity, and modernization of quarters throughout," stated Dyer.

Among the details involved are the new addition, extending the building 26 feet in depth, the placement of new re-inforced concrete and steel vaults, the installation of 400 new safe deposit boxes, enlargement of the banks' lobby to 18 by 48 feet, and the shifting of the lobby from the street side to the interior, thus moving the working quarters to the street side.

Complete new fixtures will be installed, which are said to be ultra modern in type and have the low convenient counters with bronze and plate glass trim.

Under the new addition will be a full basement in which will be installed complete new heating equipment with automatic Iron Fireman plant and with separate air-conditioning equipment which is reported to make possible an interior temperature of from 18 to 20 degrees lower than that prevailing outside.

The new addition will be two stories in height, and have available office quarters on the second floor.
