Using Honey

A number of people have inquired about using honey in canning. Honey can be used as you would sugar, about measure for measure, using a little less as honey is sweeter. In this way it costs very little more and fruit canning with honey is of a fine flavor and more easily digested than when sugar is used.

Canned Apricots

Allow from one-third to one-half of a cup of honey for each quart of fruit. When using the open kettle, put honey in after fruit is cooked and bring to a full boil and seal. If the cold pack method is used, make a syrup to pour over fruit, about one part honey to either two or three

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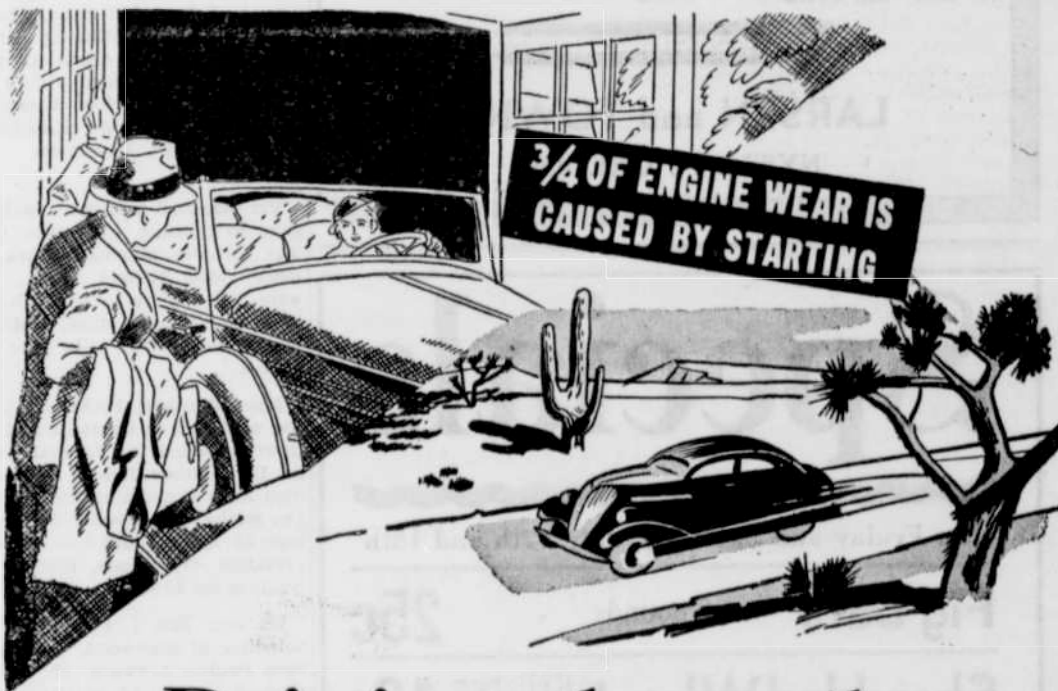
