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RECLAMATION GETS ANOTHER BOOST—

THE drought back east calls attention more forcibly than before the genuine worth of reclamation. While 100 million acres in the drouth area is baking, crops ruined and people discouraged; nearly every reclamation project has ample water. Two are short, the North Platte in Nebraska and the Belle Fourche in South Dakota, while the rest have sufficient water to mature crops and in the case of the Owyhee, enough water for next year's operations also.

We need only consider for a moment; what if there were no western reclamation lands? Would there be enough of a food shortage to cause actual famine? If the middle west becomes a permanent drouth area, the United States will more and more depend on the west for its food supply. The government is anticipating this and at the present time has 14 more reservoirs under construction which will add almost 13 million acre feet to the amount of water in storage now, which totals 19 million.

There is enough water stored in the 57 federal reclamation reservoirs to cover the entire state of South Dakota with water to a depth of five inches. This represents a big asset to the nation and a guarantee against food shortage.

HOW WOULD YOU LIKE TO GO SWIMMING—

DURING the present unusual hot spell, how nice it would be to take a cooling swim! Youngsters are especially entitled to a right to swim, but Nyssa is rather poorly equipped that way. Maybe now would be a good time to start thinking of a swimming pool again.

There are many who will say a swimming pool is impossible of maintenance under present conditions, while others stoutly say it can. Perhaps this would be a good time to actually make a study of subject, get some actual figures based on operating conditions here, and if feasible, for some organization in town to take the lead in sponsoring a pool. We note in our exchanges that Fairfield, Idaho; a town of around 300 people, is to have a swimming pool and construction was started last week.

We are in no position to know the feasibility of a pool for Nyssa, but would like to see a detailed study of the subject made and maybe before another hot summer rolls around, old and young will be able to take a swim every day in Nyssa's own municipal pool.

Senator McNary's announcement last week that in effect, he was opposed to the I-O-N, was unfortunate. Eastern Oregon has been forced to make quite a fight to even get the I-O-N started, and it is discouraging to find that the distinguished Senator is not in sympathy.

This is a very good year to hold a Husband Calling contest, being Leap Year, and no doubt there should be a separate contest for those of the fair sex who would like to try their luck at calling a prospective husband from his hiding place. Many chimneys fell, the corner of the Milton-Freewater depot collapsed, the cannery at the same place suffered \$10,000 damage and the residents all were badly frightened. No one was hurt. Seismographs at Berkeley and Pasadena recorded the quake, which lasted 15 minutes and consisted of 28 shocks.

LOANS FOR MODERNIZING HOMES ARE STILL AVAILABLE

Contrary to the belief of many people, it is still possible to get loans for modernizing homes. With the announcement recently that the Home Owner's Loan Corporation had folded up permanently, building material dealers everywhere have been flooded with inquiries concerning the stoppage of home loans.

The F. H. A. (Federal Housing Administration) is still operating and both insured mortgages for new homes, and loans for modernization and repairs can still be had under this Federal plan.

The Home Owner's Loan Corporation was a governmental loaning institution whereby loans for repairs and modernization were a part of its refinancing plan. Under the F.H.A. plan, which is still making loans for modernization, such as roofing, painting, building additional rooms, etc., are made through banks and other financial institutions, and insured to the loaners by the government through the Federal Housing Commission. This plan is still open to anyone with the financial ability to repay the loans, and the closing of the Home Owner's Loan Corporation does not affect anyone who wants to improve his home.
