Mr. and Mrs. Emil Claude returned to their camp near South mountain Monday. Mr. Claude is employed with the sheep there.

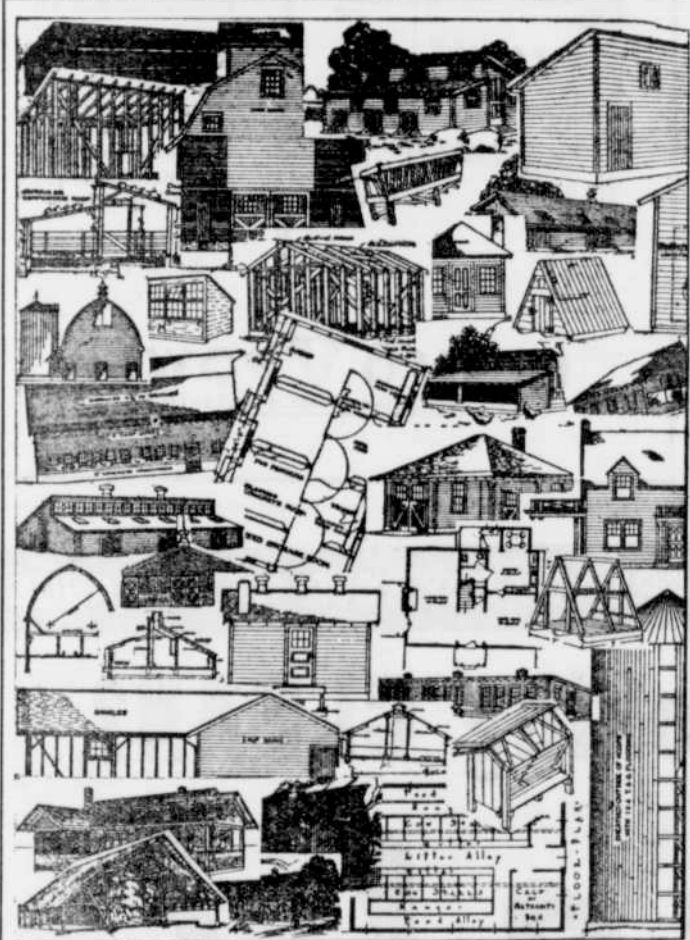
Mrs. Rose Mattingly and Miss Mary Ellen Greeley made a trip to Ontario Tuesday and returned on Thursday.
