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Squirts FROM THE LINOTYPE

Many people will look with favor on the recent decision of the Malheur county relief committee to withhold relief from any person operating an automobile. The original purpose of relief was an emergency measure to prevent people from going hungry. Gradually the restrictions have been getting laxer and easier, to the detriment of public morale. Operating a car does not come under the heading of alleviating hunger, and the committee rightfully feels that the funds should not be spent for anything but absolute necessities.

Now comes A. R. Hollingshed, a rancher west of Vale who announces his intention of putting in a toll gate on the Central Oregon highway and make motorists pay for traveling over a short piece of ground he claims as his own. The county court claims that the right-of-way was purchased in 1929 from Morris McCarty for a sum of \$35. Hollingshed wants \$2,500 for a right-of-way involving around five acres.

In an effort to boost city revenues, Payette has enacted two new ordinances. One boosts the city license fee on dealers who sell beer from \$50 to \$100 a year. The other ordinance places a city license fee of \$18 a quarter on all "machines or devices operated by the use of coins or merchandise coins;" in other words, slot machines and ball machines.

Even soft ball players have their troubles. Last week in Caldwell, four boys were brought into court, charged with criminal trespassing when they went onto the yard of a lady to retrieve a ball which landed on her property during a game being played at Jaycee field.

Mrs. Emma C. Larsen, long time resident of Nampa, was killed in an automobile accident last week when a bee flew in the car and hit the driver in the face. The car got out of control, left the road and turned over in the barrow pit.

There was considerable interest in Idaho's primary election held Tuesday. Senator Borah won the senatorial nomination in a landslide victory over his Townsend opponent, Byron Defenbach. Gov. Ross won by a surprisingly small majority over his opponent for the nomination, John Carver. Mix, Clark and Miller were bunched for the democratic nomination for governor, and the final result will likely be unknown until all the outlying precincts have reported.

Frank Stephens of Twin Falls outdistanced his nearest rival for the Republican nomination for governor, which was Col. Patch of Payette.
