Honey Graham Cookies

This is a recipe that makes enough cookies to last the children several days, or will keep fresh a long time if you are cooking for a hay crew.

2c honey, 1c sugar, 1c lard, 1c sour milk 1 table spoon soda 1 table spoon vanilla 3c graham flour.

Mix cookies and add enough white flour to make a soft dough to roll thin and cut. Soften 2 lbs. of ground dates with a little honey and use for filling between two cookies. Any other filling such as raisins, nuts, prunes, or any combination may be used. Bake in a moderate oven.

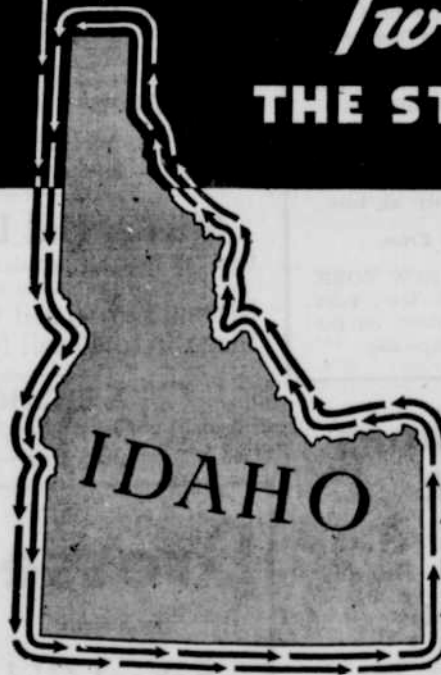
