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THE AVERAGE MAN IS BETTER OFF

From Democratic National Committee

William E. Cow, Jr., head of James B. Clow & Sons, Chicago manufacturers, has issued a pamphlet entitled: "A Business Man's Personal Views of the Roosevelt Administration," in which he declares that President Roosevelt's record entitles him to an overwhelming reelection.

Speaking as a business man of long experience, he says that failure of the country to re-elect Mr. Roosevelt "would be a crying act of ingratitude to a man who has given his all in a desperate situation to help the country in every conceivable way and who has succeeded so magnificently."

"Let's forget all arguments," he writes, "as to whether we should have gone off the gold-standard—as to whether the Government should have put on a relief program or not—as to whether aid should have been given to our agricultural population—as to whether the principles of NRA, such as maximum hours, minimum wages, no child labor, collective bargaining, etc., were good or bad and just ask one question and be honest about it."

"Is or is not the average man considerably better off today than he was on March 4, 1933? In other words, the average man has a somewhat increased living expense, slightly higher taxes and has assumed his small portion of the national debt, but over against this he has his wage, the value of any property he may own, returns he may be receiving from any investment, all increased more than proportionately. So that the net result is that the average man is better off today than he was on March 4, 1933."

"The real answer is that nine out of ten people are considerably better off than they were and, regardless of their political persuasion, they cannot deny it."

"Because, in the last analysis, the real job of a President is to do all possible to make the average citizen better off at the end of his term of office than he was at the beginning. And no one can doubt that the Roosevelt administration, assisted, of course, by the economic forces of the country, has accomplished just exactly this."

"Certainly, in modern times, no administration has tackled such a job or accomplished so much."

POWER BILL WOULD MAKE DICTATORS OF POWER COMMISSIONERS

Portland, Oct. 3.—There probably are few who have so far analyzed the state power bill as to understand to what extent it permits the state to go into ownership and operation of business.

Advocates of government ownership on a huge scale should be delighted, for it holds for them possibilities of practically everything for which they could hope.

"The commission shall have power to do ALL things NECESSARY or CONVENIENT to carry out the provisions of this act." That is a quotation from the bill.

So far as I can see the commission

would be the sole judge of what might be necessary or convenient.

The operation of gravel pits, the manufacture of meters, of glass insulators, of poles, lumber and timbers, and concrete are possible industrial activities in which the new three-man power commission might engage under terms of the state power measure. Certainly these things would be convenient to a state power system.

The commission is specifically empowered to develop minerals and other deposits which it may find upon all state-owned lands, title to which is definitely given to the proposed new power commission.

Why not printing offices to print its supplies?

Why not grocery, clothing and hardware stores for the convenience of employees?

Some of these samples are far-fetched.

But no one can successfully dispute that the commission would be empowered to do these things.

No one can successfully dispute that men who would like to do these things will be candidates for power commissioners.

stenographers, the money being used as a campaign fund.

An assortment of violations of the corrupt practices act.

Political activity among "straw bosses" in the WPA organization. Threatening merchants with boycott unless they remove pictures of Landon from their store windows.

The investigation includes reports on boondoggling projects where there has been waste and extravagance, these instances being collected from various parts of Oregon.

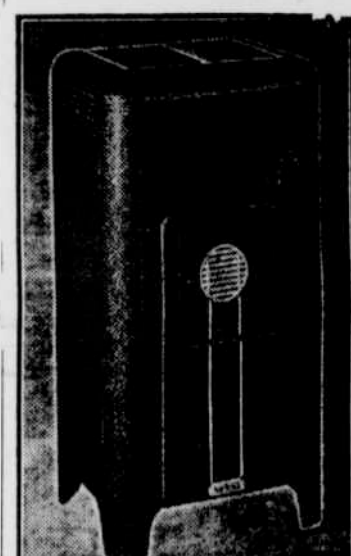

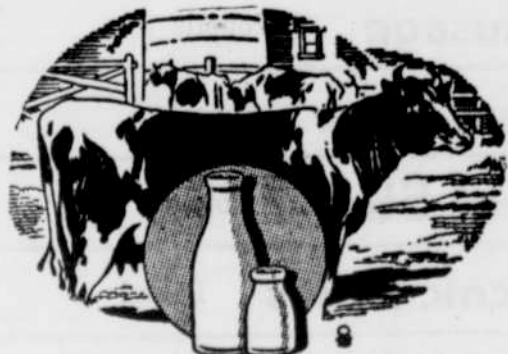
