GIFT TO SUGAR BEET GROWERS—

FOR many long and weary years the electorate has listened to political harangue, and in their appeal to the masses, political stumpers often crucify the large corporations as being "soulless." Nor is this charge hurled by politicians alone. It is fashionable to hold the big boys up to the light as terrible examples, trying to crush the life blood from those less fortunate.

The informed public know this is not true, but it remained for a several million dollar corporation this week to prove to the people of Nyssa that corporations do have a soul. We refer to the Amalgamated Sugar Company.

Last spring when the beet contracts were signed, there was a rider attached to those in this territory, specifying that the grower was to pay 50 per cent on the freight charges from here to the factory at Twin Falls. The total freight charge is \$1.75 per ton and the company originally agreed to absorb \$1.25 of this amount. Now the "soulless" corporation volunteers to absorb the entire amount, and thus directly put approximately \$6,000 more money into the pockets of local growers.

The company was not petitioned to do this, and their action came as a pleasant surprise to growers, meaning as it does an additional \$7.50 per acre on a conservative yield of 15 tons to the acre.

This is the kind of company which wishes to come into the territory with a two million dollar factory. "By their actions, you shall know them"—and it looks like the company is a mighty nice firm to do business with.

Arthur Jones, 18, of Burns was fatally injured in a hunting accident. The boy went to pick up his gun after a rest, and it discharged; the bullet entering the right side near the hip, ranging upward through the right lung and shoulder. The accident happened on Emigrant creek and it was four hours before he could be brought to the hospital at Burns. This was the first hunting accident of the year for eastern Oregon.

The Oregon law provides that for any hunter or other user of firearms who accidentally injures or kills another person, that hunter can never again carry a firearm of any kind within the state of Oregon. The section reads: "It shall be unlawful for any person who has killed or injured another with a firearm at any time after said killing or injury to carry or bear firearms of any kind or description within the state of Oregon."

Indications are that more and more of our young people are seeking higher educations. Word comes from Oregon State College that the enrollment this year reached the all-time high of 3716 students. This is in contrast to an enrollment of 1945 just three years ago. At the University of Oregon registration has reached a total of 2876, an increase of six per cent over this time last year.

The city of Bandon, recently completely destroyed by fire, will be rebuilt as a planned community, according to a word received by the Oregon state planning board. Bandon has an opportunity to rebuild as a model coast industrial and recreational center, and residents are enthusiastic over the future of their city.

We note in the report from the Biological Survey that Robert "Pud" Long tied for high place during September in the amount of coyotes captured, but led the state in predatory animals by catching 4 bobcats during the month. His nearest rival was M. E. Jacobs of Lake county who tied Long with 58 coyotes during the month, but only captured 2 bobcats as against 4 for Long. Nearly every month the Nyssa boy leads the 33 hunters working under the biological survey.
