Blocks and Tackles

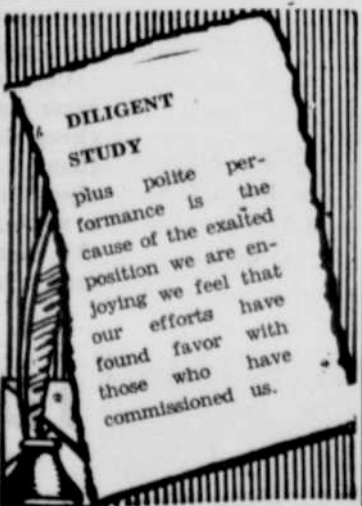
Ontario showed surprising strength last week to defeat Vale 13 to 0. Neither team scored in the first half, but the Ontario team, sparked by Stewart, made long gains through the Vale line to hit pay dirt in the third stanza, and again in the final quarter. Wilder whipped Roswell 21 to 0. In the big high school game Saturday afternoon, Boise downed Caldwell 7 to 0. The loss Saturday broke Caldwell's string of four victories and installed Boise as the favorite to take the conference championship.

Williamette University had easy pickings Friday night against the College of Idaho and ran up a 47 to 0 tally. At the same time, Boise Junior College took Gooding into camp 21 to 6 in a game played on Public School Field in Boise.

Upsets marked the college play over the week end, with the defeat of Pitt and Princeton being the biggest surprises. The comparatively small Duquesne knocked off Pitt 7 to 0. Pitt had just defeated Ohio state the week before and seemed headed for national honors. Princeton last to Penn's fighting Quakers 7 to 0 and thus broke a winning streak extending past last season.

In the west, Washington State and U.S.C. battled to a scoreless tie and at the same time Washington defeated Oregon State 19 to 7 to retain the lead in the conference race. Oregon woke up in the last half and pushed over two touchdowns to win from Idaho, 13 to 0. U.S.L.A. established itself as football power by flattening California, 17 to 6.

Nyssa dropped another decision Thursday on the home field when they lost to Emmett, 25 to 0. Although putting up a game fight, they were overpowered by the heavier team from Emmett. This week Nyssa goes to Weiser with the Idaho team heavily favored to win. The following week, October 30th, will see Vale and Nyssa tangling on the Vale field. Nyssa may win this game, especially if Johnston is able to take his place in the lineup by that time.
