## IT'S PRIVATE PROPERTY—

Men who make their living on the soil do not appreciate the careless and thoughtless hunter who tramples crops and frightens livestock.

But most of them are good enough neighbors to allow a certain amount of liberty with their property if the hunter makes a gentlemanly request before invading the fields. Every bird hunter should have permission of the farmer before vaulting the fence and shooting in all directions.

Most hunters are real sportsmen, but the thoughtless few put the entire fraternity in the doghouse with most farmers.

Just remember it's private property and you are hunting there because the farmer is good enough to permit it.

THERE ARE TWO facts few hunters appreciate: the farmer gets few birds himself, yet he often feeds the birds out of his own grain store in heavy winters when the natural feed is impossible to find.

## ONE YEAR'S GROWTH MAKES HEALTHY YOUNGSTER—

The local CCC camp celebrated their first birthday Saturday, and today the company stands as a model for other CCC camps, with a splendid group of boys, examples of American youth at it's best. Company 926 was one of the first companies organized in Oregon and is made up of Oregon enrollees.

Among the improvements made at the camp must be mentioned the graveling of the entire camp area; construction and graveling of camp roads; finishing up interior of officers' quarters and barracks, Bureau of Reclamation quarters, office, recreation hall, supply room, and infirmary. Construction of sewer system, construction of a unique camp entrance, building of big camp refrigerator; two gas houses, power house, carpenter and blacksmith shop.

Other improvements at the camp, which are very noticeable now by contrast a year ago are the grass planted in quadrangle and on front camp area; building of rock garden and planting of shrubbery around officers' quarters; installation of a pressure system and rock fountain between office and officers' quarters; unique rock fireplace in recreational hall and construction of a boxing arena and bleachers.

All of these improvements, and more, have been made during the past year; adding pleasure and enjoyment to the boys in camp.

Visitors at the CCC camp always receive a warm welcome, and if you have not seen the camp lately, we suggest you drive out and get better acquainted. You will be impressed, we are certain.

## STATE TAX MONEY IS NOW INVESTED—

Most political observers say the state bank bill will be the worst defeated measure on the ballot; and it looks that way now; although experts have been fooled before and such may be the case this year. However, there must be considerable misunderstanding regarding the bill.

For example the proponents of the Bank bill speak glibly of state tax money in terms of 50 million or 100 million dollars; pictured as laying idle in vaults while it should be earning interest. The next time they picture the funds as being borrowed from bankers at exorbitant rates of interest.

Getting down to facts, we think Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, should know whereof he speaks. Mr. Holman says that the state has done no borrowing whatever in more than a year; also that, as the states' funds are now administered by the state treasurer's office, interest is earned from investments in short term securities as well as from money on deposit in banks.

The last occasion on which money was bor-

rowed by the state, according to Mr. Holman, was in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935. The highest and lowest rates of interest upon money so borrowed were 2 per cent and 3 per cent. The total amount of interest paid on these loans in this fiscal year was the sum of only \$1,425.69, while interest earnings on deposits in state depositories alone during the same fiscal year amounted to \$79,221.779. The cash difference between interest paid and interest received by the state was \$77,796.10 in favor of the taxpayers.

The state now can and does invest its idle funds in sound securities just as it would if it operated a bank with a large and high salaried staff of political appointees. Under existing laws, however, state officials are not permitted to make "loans" to their political friends and this may have some influence on those urging the establishment of a state bank. Certainly the state funds are now handled in a manner dictated by sound business practice and a state bank is absolutely unnecessary. There is plenty for the state to do without getting into the banking and power business. The next step could just as well be state owned grocery stores, state owned service stations, state owned hardware, state owned farms—the list could be stretched indefinitely, without stretch of the imagination.

Mrs. W. H. Beam has been filed for the office of City Recorder, and will be opposed by the present incumbent, Bob Millar. Dr. Abbott has withdrawn his name as a candidate for mayor, leaving the race up to date between Mayor Don Graham and Councilman A. C. Norcott.

At one of the recent meetings of the council, the City Recorder was appointed as a sort of city manager to relieve the councilmen of many

minor duties. For example, if a complaint comes in regarding someone's chickens being annoying, instead of a councilman having to take an hour or two of his valuable time to settle the question, the matter will be turned over to the city manager.

Big Bend PTA held their regular business meeting Wednesday and laid plans for the Halloween Carnival to be held the evening of October 31 at the Big Bend School House.
