IRRIGATION DISTRICTS FIGHT STATE POWER BILL

Portland, Ore., Oct. 23—(Special)—Those interested in irrigation and drainage districts of the state are so certain of the possibility of injury to them through enactment of the state power bill which will be on the November ballot that a large group of such persons are making a determined fight against that bill.

While it seems to have been the intention of those who drafted the bill to protect the interests of those who now use, or may hereafter wish to use, water for agricultural purposes, yet the wording of the power bill is so indefinite that persons using such water are not willing to take a chance on what might be done by a three-man power commission, from whose decisions there apparently would be no appeal.

The power bill specifically empowers, and practically directs, the power commission "to withdraw for power development any unappropriated waters of the state." There is at least a doubt as to whether a powerful state commission could be persuaded to return to agricultural use water once appropriated by the commission for power purposes.

A negative argument on the power bill in the voters' pamphlet is signed by 32 prominent farmers, ranchers and livestock men.

A statement asking defeat of the power bill solely on the grounds of its possible interference with rights of users of water for agricultural purposes has been issued by a group of officers of irrigation and drainage districts. Among the signers of this statement are Frank Morgan of Nyssa and Earl Blackaby of Ontario.

The statement calls attention to a resolution adopted by the 1936 Oregon Reclamation congress which recently met at Vale. That resolution appealed for recognition in enactments by the legislature or people of the basic economic principle that in the utilization of water domestic and agricultural uses come first.

Here Is My
Platform of Principles

TO THE VOTERS OF
MALHEUR COUNTY:

Having received the nomination for Sheriff by the Republican Voters of Malheur County, I feel that it is no more than right to inform the entire people of Malheur County as to how I stand and feel in the matter of the administration of the affairs of the Sheriff's office.

I am a married man, and have raised my family right here in Malheur County, where I have lived for 26 years, and for the past 12 years have served as Marshall of the City of Nyssa, with a record that stands for itself, and which can be attested to by 7 Mayors under whom I have served.

When elected Sheriff of this County, I will assume the office with the full understanding that I will give the people of Malheur County an administration free from petty partisanship, and will endeavor to hire help that will be qualified to carry out their duties to the best advantage of the taxpayers of Malheur County.

During the term of office I will not at any time, enter into private business, nor associate myself with any interest that may benefit myself or others through the fact that I am Sheriff of Malheur County, but will give the Citizens of Malheur County my undivided time and efforts towards an efficient administration of the duties of the Sheriff's Office.

I will not allow or use any County owned automobiles for any other purpose or business than that of County business, nor will I allow the use of any Gasoline or other County owned property to be used for any other purpose than that of County business.

I will not buy directly or indirectly any property being sold by the Sheriff under execution, neither will I allow any member of my family to do so, neither will I allow any information of whatsoever kind or nature to pass out to friends pertaining to County lands whereby they might benefit through the purchase thereof.

I will advertise for bidders to

board the County Prisoners and will award the boarding of these prisoners to the lowest bidder, and will not allow any of my family or relatives to bid on said board.

Towards the end that the expense of the Sheriff's office be kept down, I will call upon the State Police to function to the fullest extent of their duties, and co-operate with me in all matters wherein they can be of assistance, thereby reducing the expenditure for Deputies, which will naturally save the Taxpayers of Malheur County an unnecessary expense.

In this day of radio and telephone and telegraph, and with the Postoffice facilities, it seems to me that the expense of the Sheriff's office can be materially cut down by taking advantage of these modern means, and this I intend to do to the fullest extent, which will mean a further saving of Tax money.

During the time I have served as Marshall of Nyssa, I have studied and have become the only accredited finger-print expert in Eastern Oregon, which the State and Federal Authorities believe is a necessary qualification for a Sheriff in the performance of the duties of that office in this advanced age for crime detection, and have been called upon as a Finger-print expert by the authorities whenever my services were required.

At no time previous to my nomination as Sheriff nor since I have been nominated for that office, have I spoken with anyone nor promised any person or persons any jobs in connection with the office of Sheriff.

The present Sheriff has served three four-year terms and four years as deputy, making a total of sixteen years in the Sheriff's office. If elected I will not ask for even a third term.

Any Public Officer paid by the Taxpayers should ever remember that he or she is a public servant, and as such, should endeavor to extend to the public every courtesy and assistance within their reach and ability, to the end that the Servant serve their Master.
