THREE CCC CAMPS OF BUREAU OF RECLAMATION ARE IN THIS COUNTY

There is a total of five Bureau of Reclamation CCC camps in the state, and out of these, three of them are found in Malheur county. A total of 52 camps are located in the state, with the largest number being national forest camps. Twenty camps are in this classification.

There are six soil conservation camps in the state, the nearest one to Nyssa being the camp at Beulah. The Nyssa, Ontario and Vale camps are all under the supervision of the Bureau of Reclamation.

A recent report shows that from April 1933 until August 1936, a total of \$32,934,000 had been spent by the CCC in Oregon, including \$7,082,000 sent by the boys to their dependents at home.

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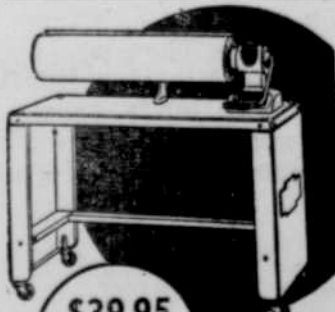
