FIREMAN'S WIDOW ASKS CITY TO GRANT PENSION

The widow of Kenneth Gould Stewart has filed in superior court in Enterprise, Oregon a complaint against the city of Enterprise seeking a monthly pension for herself and allowance for her children. Kenneth Stuart is a former resident of Nyssa, having lived here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Stuart and attended the local school up until the 4th grade.

Stuart was hurt while a member of the volunteer fire department of Enterprise in the hotel fire on May 27th and died on June 13th. His father was known as "Slim" Stuart when they lived in Nyssa.

Mrs. Stuart asks \$100 burial expenses, \$30 per month for herself for life or until she remarries, \$8 per month for each of two children and an additional \$8 monthly for a child yet unborn until each reaches the age of 18. She contends the city was negligent in failing to file Stuart's name at Salem as eligible for state industrial insurance.
