THE state of Oregon borrowed \$107,000 from the general fund less than two years ago to set the state liquor commission in business. From this original investment the commission has built up a business grossing more than \$7,000,000 annually and returned a profit in excess of \$2,250,000 a year. The \$107,000 borrowed from the general fund in 1934 was repaid last week, together with \$14,710 interest.

The informed public is pretty much in agreement that the policy of state-owned stores and dispensaries has been a success and that it is a thousand per cent better than the old moonshine days. By the same margin, it is better than the old saloon days, and any attempt to let down the bars by turning the sale of liquor to private parties will be met with militant opposition. Such a policy was advocated by Idaho's newly installed Governor Clark. We notice in reading many weekly and daily papers published in Idaho that the press is almost universally against a return of sale of liquor by licensed dealers, or to call a spade by its true name, a return to saloon days.

In California, liquor apparently can be sold by anyone able to pay the license and it is found in drug stores, grocery stores, pool rooms, hotels, restaurants and other places. Far-sighted people in that state view the situation with many misgivings and fear if conditions get too bad it will encourage the return of the equally undesirable moonshine regime.

Speaking of baby delirys; the scheme of giving gifts to the first baby born in the New Year, one paper in Idaho said last week "Such an idea might not be unworthy, but why not give everyone a fair chance and announce one for 1938?" Now there's a thought—all in favor say Aye.

Over in Parma the village trustees instructed their attorney to draft an ordinance to control or regulate the use of slot machines, punch boards and other games of chance within the corporate limits of the village. There have been similar steps taken by Oregon municipalities, yet the Oregon constitution forbids "games of chance." Nyssa may have a similar problem to wrestle with before too long and it might be well to profit by the example of experience of other cities.

One of the major public improvements in Nyssa which we rarely think of, but which is a real asset to the town, is our water system. One Idaho town, not too far distant, is not so fortunate. The matter of drinking water there for next year is causing considerable concern on the part of the citizenry. While it is true the Nyssa system should be enlarged and extended in certain portions of the town, on the whole we have a very satisfactory system here. Many irrigation projects face a prospect of drought next year unless heavy snowfall this month aids the situation.
