## TERTELINGS GETS CONTRACT ON YAKIMA PROJECT WORK

Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes announced today award of the contract for construction of the Pomona siphon and wasteway and construction of 8,000 feet of the Yakima Ridge canal, Roza division of the Yakima project, to J. A. Terteling & Sons of Boise, Idaho, on their bid of \$374,409.

The successful bid was the lowest of twelve received by the Bureau of Reclamation December 14, 1936, at its Yakima, Washington office.

The contract contemplates the lining of the canal with concrete except at the siphon and bench flume sites. About 4,300 feet of the canal will consist of a continuous concrete bench flume.

The Pomona siphon will carry the Yakima Ridge canal across the Yakima River at a point near the town of Pomona, Washington. The siphon will be cylindrical with a radius of 7 feet 8 inches. It will be about 1,400 long and will be of reinforced concrete construction.

The contractor must begin work within thirty days after notice to proceed is issued and has five hundred calendar days in which to complete the contract.

State Legislator From Malheur County

Staples of Ontario, Malheur county's representative in the House should be of interest. The Oregon Voter said:

How much will it cost? is a query quite characteristic of Representative Virgil B. Staples. Talks very little, observes carefully, votes with discrimination. Served several years on Ontario city council, also was postmaster of Vale. Has had experience in varied and diverse business lines. Located in Ontario 1898 and worked for Malheur Forwarding Co.; in clothing and furnishings; later as Griffin & Staples; later conducted Ford agency. Sold this 1929, since then farming and overseeing various properties. Former president Ontario Commercial Club.

In young manhood was a cow-puncher on O-O and P ranches in Harney county. Was born on farm near Henderson, Ky., October 10, 1877. Substantial property owner and taxpayer. One of the few third-termers; right-wing; silent but constructive and useful legislator. Courageous, high principled.
