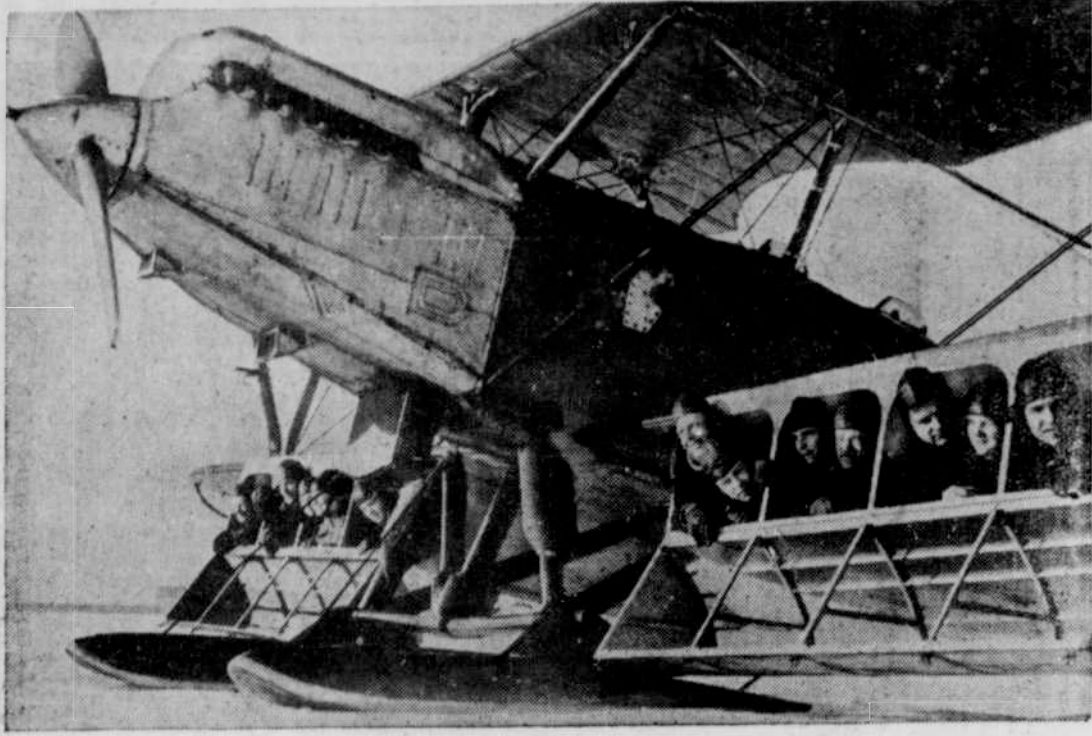


## Trick Accommodations on New Soviet Plane

**GENERAL MOTORS MAY QUIT DELIVERING SOON**

Detroit—Continuance of the present strike situation in the automobile industry will mean a complete suspension of General Motors deliveries to dealers in a short time, it was indicated in authoritative sources this week.

Heavy demand greeted the introduction of all new models throughout the industry last November. When the strike in General Motors plants developed, each of the corporation's units had a heavier bank of unfilled orders on hand than at any time in the last decade, with the possible exception of the 1929 boom period.
