### Legislative Highlights

Weather and lawmakers occupied the attention of Oregon people during the last week over all other news.

Continued cold and an epidemic of influenza relegated even strike news to secondary importance, with an estimated 20,000 people in the state suffering with severe colds, flu or pneumonia according to medical authorities. An emergency hospital was established at the Bonneville dam by the National Hospital Association to care for sick workmen there. All hospitals of the state were taxed for bed space. Many schools were closed or running with depleted staffs.

In the legislature the outstanding event was the reported error in the budget as submitted to Governor Charles H. Martin. Instead of a surplus of approximately \$200,000 it was found that Oregon has a deficit of more than \$500,000.

The mistake was made in entering almost \$1,000,000 in the budget which the state did not have, C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter pointed out.

Budget Director Wharton blamed

the tax commission. He promised that the budget would be balanced.

Few important measures were dropped in the heppers during the week. Aid for education was taken back to committee because of alleged ambiguity. The branch bank bill is still in committee with many expressions that it will have little purpose now. The state is head pretty well branch-banked as it is.

Aside from the law-grinding State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman issued a statement objecting to a one-man government in Oregon. He opposes a plan said to be in favor with Governor Martin that would make the governor the only elective officer in the state.

A bill to limit salaries in higher education and eliminate the offices now held by W. J. Kerr, those of chancellor emeritus and director of production and marketing research has been proposed by Representative Fuhrer of Marion county.

Another measure being drafted would place a \$5 tax on all radio receiving sets.

The senate revision of laws committee has reported out favorably the bill to make it unnecessary for

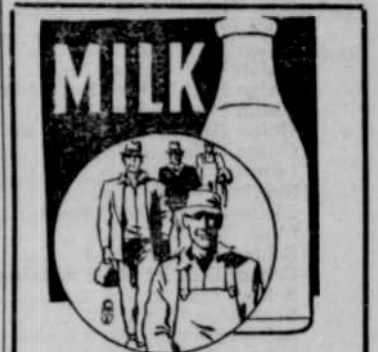

a police officer to get a shot to make suspected drunken drivers.

Also in connection with crime laws committee is reporting favorably on proposals to "realize automatic good time" for convicts. The famous Fehl case brought this to a head.

The house during the week staved off a liquor battle by indefinite postponement of the bill to prohibit liquor advertising in Oregon newspapers.

Repeal of the anti-syndicalism act, Sunday closing, conservation of the state forests, several acts designed to aid irrigation districts, school districts and state departments are other matters still before the lawmakers.
