The School Paper As A Project

The following article appeared in the January issue of the Oregon Educational Journal and was written by Albert B. Hopkins, principal of the Oregon Trail School. We re-publish the article, feeling that the information regarding the school paper published at Oregon Trail will be of interest to local readers.

After six years of publishing and distributing a monthly mimeograph school paper in the school, I am convinced of its effectiveness in promoting educational standards among the pupils and patrons of the district. The process is simple and the cost is small. The results are great in proportion to the trouble and expense.

There are two types of mimeographed school papers, the newspapers and magazine. We use the latter, or rather a combination of the two with emphasis on the magazine type. It is readily understood that the news element cannot be played up to any great extent because of the time feature. We lay emphasis, however, on school events to take place the coming month, with a resume of the important things which have happened since the last issue, for example: The "Rules and Regulations Governing the Malheur County Declaratory Conference," were carried in detail. This served to whet the interest of both parents and children in the coming event. News is always carried on the Parent-Teacher Association, 4-H Club work, and news of civic interest pertaining directly to the school.

News, incidentally, is also sent to the three county papers, The Malheur Enterprise, The Gate City Journal, and The Ontario Argus. These papers have always cooperated in publishing the news of the school. A copy of "The Trail" our monthly mimeographed sheet of usually eight pages, is also sent to the newspapers.

In the school paper we allow the children to have their poetical urges and themes printed. This is an incentive to the child to excel in English. The parents also take a decided interest in the printed articles of their children. Creating the article is a means of natural and spontaneous child-development. A different staff is appointed every three months, including: editor in chief, assistant editor, sports editor, poem editor, society editor, news editor, art editor and humorous

editor. There is a space under the masthead for editorials. A full page of sports is carried. A page of verses written by the children are part of the monthly schedule. Artists are allowed space, and many presentable cartoons and pictures by children have been printed. In the humor page, names of local children and patrons and teachers are substituted and it is surprising to note the delight these children get from the reading and telling of the jokes. A column is carried each month for tardies and absences. The result is a much better attendance over former years. The children do not wish to see their names carried in these columns month after month. An honor roll for various events creates interest. A new pupil column, when necessary, and a visitor roll is included in the paper.

The cost can be met by subscriptions or by advertisements of local merchants or nearby storekeepers printed in the paper. Subscriptions may be obtained for the year in advance or quarterly which pays for the supplies. The school itself may allow a certain percentage of profit from a school charged event to take care of the cost, thereby providing free distribution to children and patrons. Many times school board will allow the expenses of the school paper and give free distribution. This is satisfactory. Free distribution is preferable for the mimeographed sheet if the expense can be raised.

The value of advertising in the

mimeographed paper depends upon the extent of its circulation and coverage. If the coverage is justifiable, the merchant can be persuaded to advertise his products. He desires results and such can be had if the circulation covers the district properly. Advertising displays should be changed each month to insure variety and to further guarantee considerably more valuable to the local advertiser. It is considered by the advertiser if his advertising is being grouped in solid pages. Prices for ads may range from 15 cents to 30 cents per column inch. According to the rate charged, income from advertising can easily be estimated. In a two-column eight page paper, such as ours, with 70 percent news and magazine material and 30 percent advertising at 20 cents per column inch would net \$7 for one issue.

We exchange papers with several schools thereby gaining an exchange of ideas. Mimeographed sheets may be entered in contests over the country. The Columbia Scholastic Press Association at Columbia University New York City, and schools of journalism in many state universities and colleges conduct contests for mimeograph newspapers. If local art is not desired, formographs already cut can be purchased and glued into the stencil. This provides a much better makeup but cuts down the originality and interest of the local group who participate in the makeup of the paper. Headlines can be lettered in with typewriter or cut into the stencil by the pupil or teacher. Very attractive illustrations and cartoons can be provided if the pupil is allowed to give way to his own ideas—sponsored of course by the teacher. The paper in the school has its rightfully earned place. It has a function to perform and that job is to unite closer into a bond of cooperation, the teachers and the patrons. Such it does.
