Mrs. Elva Jones and Mrs. Pauline Beers are spending a week with their sister, Mrs. Jack Dunning.

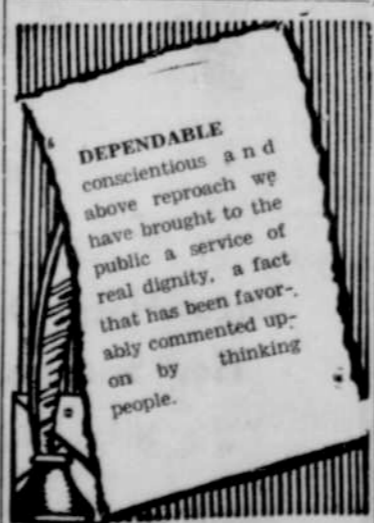
