Sugar Beets Considered As Two Crops In One

The tops from an acre of 16-ton beets have a feeding value at taping time equal to about 3,240 pounds of corn. This calculation is based on the analysis of fresh tops as given in Morrison's Feeds. Feeding and on average yields of beet tops secured in the intermountain states. According to these figures, this acre of beet tops contains at taping time 2617 lbs. of total digestible nutrients as compared to 1612 lbs. in a ton of shelled corn.

Common feeding practice has indicated that this acre of tops at present returns a feeding value about equal to a ton of alfalfa; or in other words a little over 1000 lbs. of total digestible nutrients. What becomes of the high feeding value in these tops? In many cases tops are left lying in windrows for weeks or even months in the field, or are gathered into small piles and left exposed to the elements until fed.

What would happen to your alfalfa hay if it were handled in like manner? It would probably be worth little more than straw.

Beet tops represent a valuable feed supply worthy of much better care than it received. Surely conservation methods can be devised to retain a much larger proportion of these valuable feed nutrients. Beet tops are more perishable than alfalfa.

Compare for instance this original feeding value in tops to the feeding value of wet beet pulp and molasses secured from the same tonnage of beets. The comparison in a net feeding value basis would look like this:

Nutrients (Lbs.)	Total Digestible
Tops from 16 tons beet	2617
Wet pulp from 16 tons beets	768
Molasses from 16 tons beets	160

Up to the present time we seem to have been losing over half the original feeding value of beet tops through present methods of handling and feeding them. What can be done about it? We can at least plan to treat them as well as we do our hay, that is, cure them quickly with straw or hay, where they will be protected from the elements until they are fed.

In every beet growing area there are today a few observant feeders who fully realize the high feeding value of tops and can testify to beneficial results secured through careful conservation.

Beet tops provide protein of excellent quality. They furnish a cheap source of fattening feed. Their high mineral content stimulates digestion and assimilation on heavy fattening rations. With the present day trend toward a shortage of leymuminous forage, they should generally be fed throughout the entire feeding period, provided their feeding value can be conserved.

Like all other beet by-products, they are low in phosphorus and can be expected to return their highest feeding value only when there is sufficient phosphorus fed in the ration to satisfy the requirements of the animal.

In conclusion don't forget there's the equivalent of about a ton and a half of corn lying out on each acre that you have had in sugar beets. What are you going to do about it?

FEEDING THE CCC

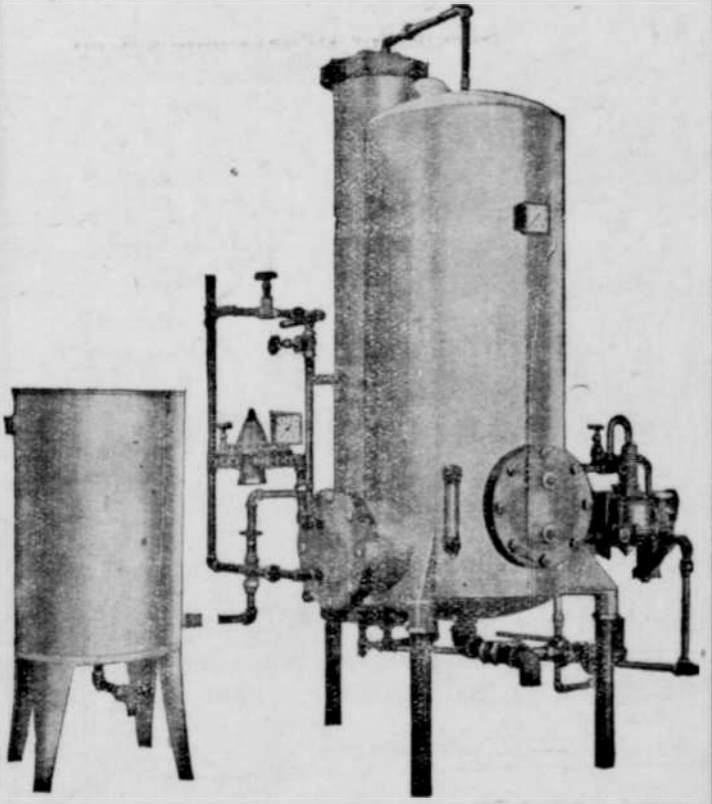
