## Random Shots . . .

(Oregon News Bureau)

Dedicating a new community hospital at Silverton last week Governor Charles H. Martin surprised 2000 listeners when he said he was not a candidate for the governorship of Oregon.

News commentators immediately saw in General Martin's statement a strong hint that he did not want to enter the next primaries to succeed himself.

Speaking of "pussyfooting" politicians he said:

"The pussyfooters need not be alarmed. I am not a candidate for the governorship of Oregon, but I will be governor of Oregon and of all the people of Oregon until my term expires."

The governor's remarks were leveled at Dr. Town Nylander, trial examiner of the federal labor relations board, the state chief executive admitted, adding that he would not permit "parlor pink" professors to come into Oregon and tell him how to run the state.

The Oregon state bar association board of governors will hold its April meeting in Medford, having been invited there by the Jackson county bar. The board will convene in the southern Oregon city on Saturday, April 17, when it is expected that several decisions of importance to the legal fraternity will be made.

That there will be a much larger acreage of potatoes planted in the Klamath basin this year, is the report of market commentators, who expect also to see the price reduced when harvest time comes.

An Oregon farmer called attention to an economic rule that the price of potatoes has been regulated by supply and demand and that every year after high prices everyone goes in for "spuds" even the city dweller who has a vacant lot.

The United States patent office, at a convention of inventors in the east, announced a long list of needed inventions for which no applications had as yet been made. Then up stepped a nine-year old boy who had invented a new kind of potato masher, with the statement that he

was working on an idea for a "painless neck scrubber" that would be of great satisfaction to lots of little boys.

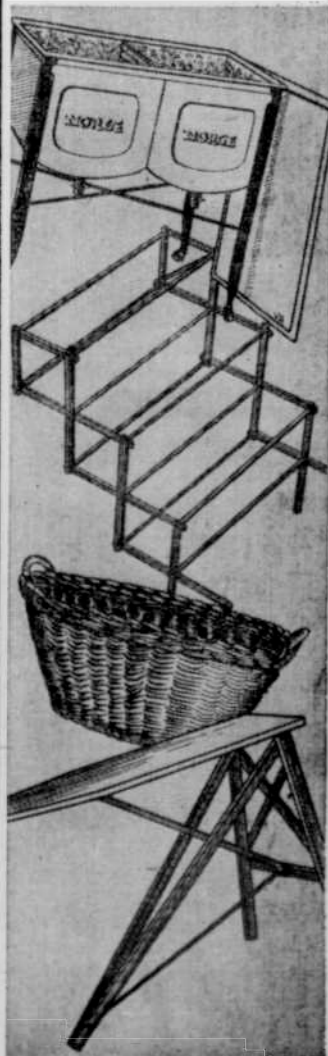

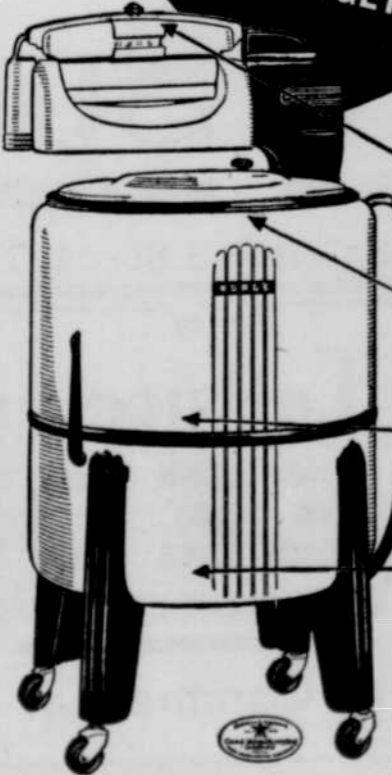
