Fruit and Vegetables for Third of Nation Handled by Auctions

PHILADELPHIA, PA.—The fresh fruit and vegetable supply of 40,000,000 people, approximately one-third the population of the United States, is handled by fruit and vegetable auction markets in ten cities. This compilation is disclosed in a study of consumer purchasing power recently made by the American Fruit and Produce Auction Association.

Auction markets serving producers and shippers of the major fruit and vegetable growing states are situated in ten leading northern cities, as follows: Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chicago, and St. Louis.

Buyers representing independent dealers, chain stores, jobbers, wholesalers and every other factor of trade in the metropolitan areas make competitive bids for fruit and produce at the auctions every day. With supply and demand establishing the market price, this system of marketing effectively serves the growers in the producing areas.

Auctioneers who direct the sales, bring to their task years of training and experience in handling fruit and produce, plus a knowledge of marketing and contacts with the trade. Thus they are enabled to obtain for the grower the highest possible value for his crop.
