He was for seven years dean of men at the University of Nevada and later spent three years in New York as secretary of the University Department of the Council of Church Boards of Education, and two years as president of Trinity university at Wapakchah, Texas.

Orma J. Smith is acting president of the Caldwell school, who has announced that Dr. Leach will be formally inaugurated as president during Commencement in June.

Many Fine Ranches Seen On Trip Over New Project

On Sunday afternoon my family and I accompanied by Joyce Ashcraft took the faithful family bus and went for tour of inspection thru the newly settled district of the Owyhee project. We drove north on the Adrian-Nyssa highway, viewed the Owyhee river in its annual spring run which has been so great that the state highway commission has maintained guard over the new bridge day and night fearing that it would wash out. This great flow of water is very disappointing to some of the old timers who predicted that the reservoir would never be filled.

From here we traveled north for two miles where we turned west onto the new land, traveling in that direction past the ranches of the Ashby's, Jack Simpson and a great many others whom we did not know; to Terteling's construction camp, which looks practically abandoned, thence west to the CCC camp which we thought was kept very neat and clean, everything being very orderly and systematically arranged. From here we drove past the ranches of John Strickland, Charles Chritton, J. J. Kollen, Robert Cox and others where we saw some very fine fields of alfalfa.

Then we turned north to the beautiful ranch home of S. E. Flanagan, which has been recently completed. This home is strictly modern having electricity and running water and nearly all other city conveniences. Here we turned back and passed the homes of Neil Dimmick and John A. Low whose ranch we consider as neatly kept as any on the project.

We then turned north and drove up onto the Bench to the ranch of O. E. Cheldelin who is an enterprising young rancher from Yakima, Wn. We then turned back east past the ranches of H. L. Sisson, D. R. DeGross, Russell Cornell and R. Cornell; then north past the beautiful homes of Mrs. Florence Chase and Mr. Pfeiler, the latter of whom has building of rather unique design including one building surmounted

by a very high water tower, which is finished with a deck on top surrounded by railing. This would have been useful in days of old as a look-out for savage Indians, but we think it will be unnecessary now. In all Mr. Pfeiler has a very beautiful place.

We then turned back east to the highway and on home. We were amazed at the change in appearance in this section which we had covered as we had lived here for many years and viewed nothing but sage brush where the beautiful ranches now stand. They stand as evidence of what can be accomplished with good soil, plenty of water, energy and hard labor. We predict that this will become one of the most productive sections of the entire west.

In ending, I would say that there are three things which the new settlers need very badly. They are graveled roads, a mail route and modern schools. We are very sorry that we do not know the names of the owners of all the places on this trip as we know a great many of the people but not their location.
