Charter Amendment Election Set For May 11

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION STATE OF OREGON, COUNTY OF MALHEUR, TOWN OF NYSSA.

Notice is hereby given that an election of the qualified voters of the Town of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, will be held at the Office of the Owyhee Irrigation District in the Town of Nyssa, on the 11th day of May, 1937, between the hours of 10 o'clock A. M. and 5 P. M. for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of the Town of Nyssa, aforesaid, the following proposed charter amendments, and each of them, which proposed amendments to the Charter of the Town of Nyssa have been referred and will be submitted to the legal voters of said Town at said special election for their acceptance or rejection, as provided by Ordinance Number 223 passed by the Common Council of the Town, and approved by the Mayor on March 3rd, 1937:

Proposed amendment No. 1: That Section 1 of Chapter 1 of said Charter be amended by striking out the word "Town" from the third line of said Section and inserting the word "City" in lieu thereof.

Proposed amendment No. 2: That section 2 of Chapter 1 of said Charter be amended by striking out all of said section and inserting a new section in lieu thereof, which said new section 2, as amended shall read as follows: Section 2. The district aforesaid constituting the City of Nyssa and the limits, boundaries and territory included therein shall be as follows: The West Half of the Southwest Quarter of Section 28; The Southeast Quarter of Section 29; The East Half of the Southwest Quarter, and the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 29; The North Half of the Northeast Quarter of Section 32, all of the Northeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of section 32, excepting 9.92 acres lying East of the Oregon Short Line Railroad Right of way; The Southwest Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of Section 32; The Northwest Quarter of Section 32; The North Half of the Southwest Quarter of Section 32; The Northwest Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of Section 33; all in Township Nineteen (19) South of Range Forty-seven (47) East of Willamette Meridian in Malheur County, Oregon.

Proposed amendment No. 3: That section 1 of Chapter 2 of said Charter be amended by striking from the sixth line of said section, the word "one" and inserting the word "two" in lieu thereof, so that said section 1 of Chapter 2 as amended shall provide that the term of office of the Mayor, Treasurer, Recorder and Councilmen shall be two years, instead of one year.

Proposed amendment No. 4: That section 2 of Chapter 2 of said Charter relating to the time of holding the elections for city officers be amended so that the City Elections shall be held at the same time and places as the general elections in the state and county are held.

Proposed amendment No. 5: That a new section be added to Chapter 2, to be known as Section 2-a, providing for special elections for any purpose except the election of officers of the City.

Proposed amendment No. 6: Amending section 6 of Chapter 2, making the word "place" read "places" so that two or more voting places may be established at elections, and eliminating a portion of the old section which is now obsolete.

Proposed amendment No. 7: By striking out all of section 7 of Chapter 2, which was the special provision for the appointment of judges for the first election held under the charter, and same is now obsolete.

Proposed amendment No. 8: By striking out of section 8, Chapter 2

certain obsolete terms, and adding a provision regarding the giving of notices of all elections by the Recorder, and for the publication in a weekly newspaper of general circulation in the City of Nyssa.

Proposed amendment No. 9: Purpose is to change the hours between which the polls shall remain open at elections so that the hours shall be the same as the general law.

Proposed amendment No. 10: Purpose to eliminate words which are no longer necessary.

Proposed amendment No. 11: Adding a new section to Chapter IV to be known as Section 20, in which it shall be provided that the Common Council may by Ordinance provide for the owners of lots abutting on, adjacent to and within a reasonable distance of any public sewer to connect with said sewer and providing for the collection from the lot owners of such rates and charges as may be established by the Council.

Proposed amendment No. 12: Adding a new section to Chapter IV to be known as Section 21, giving to the council power to provide for necessary extensions to sewer by creating special sewer improvement districts and assessing the cost of such extensions against the property to be benefited thereby.

Proposed amendment No. 13: Adding a new section to Chapter 2, to be known as section 9-b, providing for the registration of voters.

Proposed amendment No. 14: Adding a new section to Chapter 2 to be known as section 9-b, providing a method for the nomination of candidates to be voted for at city elections.

Proposed amendment No. 15: Amending section 13 of Chapter IV of the Charter by giving to the common council the power to assess, levy and collect taxes for general municipal purposes, not to exceed 30 mills, annually on the dollar of all property, consistent with the Constitutional provision that the total amount levied by it in each year shall not exceed that levied in the preceding year, plus six per cent thereof.

Full and complete text of the proposed charter amendments is on file at the office of the Recorder, and same is open for the inspection of the public.

The ballots to be used at said election shall have printed upon their face the name of the municipality and date of the election, a statement to the effect that the proposed amendments were referred to the legal voters of said Town by the Common Council and each proposed amendment to the Charter so submitted will be separately printed according to the text thereof as appears in Resolution No. 28, adopted by the Common Council on April 1, 1937, or by appropriate ballot titles same to be followed by numerals indicating whether the vote is for or against said proposed amendment, the even numbers to indicate the affirmative and the odd numbers to indicate the negative vote.

The voter shall place a cross (X) between the number and the word "Yes" or between the number and the word "No", thus indicating his choice. No amendment shall be considered as adopted unless it shall receive an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast on such proposed amendment and entitled to be counted.

The polls for the reception of the ballots cast for or against each measure will, on said day and date and at the place aforesaid, be opened at the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. and remain open until the hour of 5 o'clock P. M. of the same day when the same shall be closed.

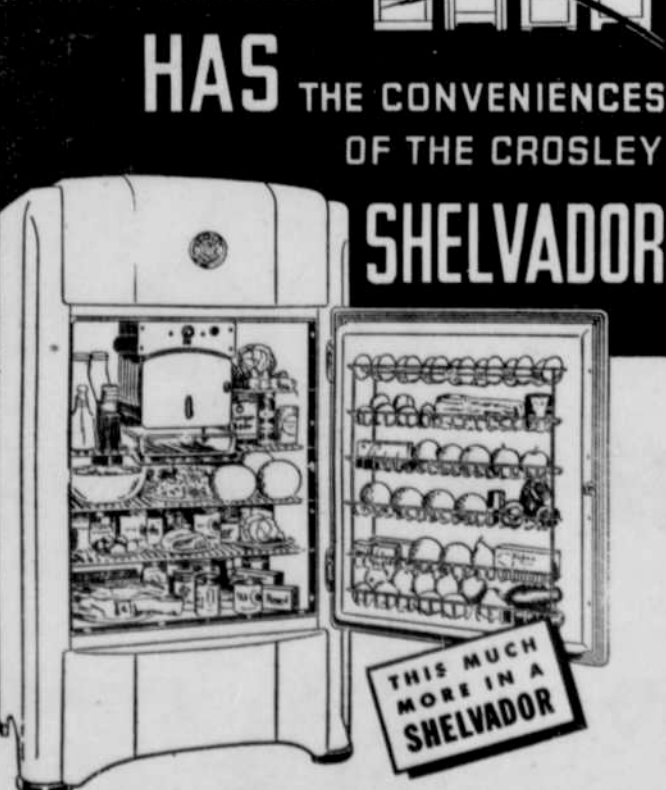
