APPELLATE COURT HOLDS SOCIAL SECURITY VOID

Boston—The United States circuit court of appeals Friday ruled unconstitutional both the unemployment insurance tax provision and the old age assistance provision of the social security act.

Shorty Neels have moved to the Chas. Allen place on the state line. Jolly Janes will meet with Pauline McGinnis Thursday, April 29th.

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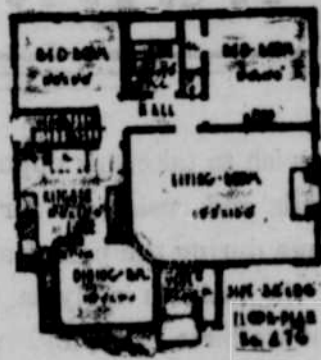
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
