### RANCHER RECEIVES \$125 FOR RIGHTS TO HIGHWAY ROUTE

A. R. Hollingshead, Little Valley rancher, will get \$125 for his 5.13 acres which are traversed by the Central Oregon highway. Judge Charles W. Ellis ruled Tuesday. Out of this he must pay his own costs. The county agreed to pay its own costs.

The result of the two-day trial was generally interpreted as a victory for Malheur county and the Oregon highway commission which started condemnation proceedings after Hollingshead had closed the road on several occasions and charged motorists toll. Before starting the action, he was offered \$125 which he turned down.

Judge Ellis' ruling came after Hollingshead had completed his case, acting as his own attorney. He had placed a number of witnesses on the stand but had failed, Judge Ellis held to prove any damage. He directed the jury to find a verdict for the county and award Hollingshead the amount originally offered.
