AUTO MISHAPS SUCCEED DISEASE IN DEADLY TOLL

Tuberculosis, the dread disease that took more lives of Oregonians than any other bodily plague in 1936, bows only automobile accidents in assisting the business of death.

Last year 376 residents of the state died from some form of consumption, but 378 were slain by motor vehicles.

The winter's wave of influenza scourged but 226 persons in Oregon. This figure is less than two-thirds of the total who succumbed after automobile mishaps.

Added to the automobile's 'champion' casualty list, however, must be also the five thousand odd persons who were injured in cars tangling on highways of the state in 1936. Many of this host will be permanently disabled for work, some permanently disfigured.
