Grade and Standards For Local Produce to Be Discussed at Meet

Mr. Frank McKennon, chief of the division of plant industry of Salem, Oregon, is calling a grade hearing to be held at the Moore Hotel, May 21 at 10 a. m.

These hearings are being arranged for the reconsideration of the grade and standards on the various commodities in conformity with the new law, which is Chapter 69, Laws 1937, and which was passed for the purpose of eliminating any question as to the constitutionality of the authority extended to the Department of Agriculture to establish grades and standards.

Under authority of Sec. 182902, Oregon Code 1930 and Chapter 69, Oregon Laws, 1937, grades and standards will be established for the following products: apples, apricots, asparagus, string beans, bunched beets, Italian sprouted broccoli, brussels sprouts, cabbage, cantaloupes, celery, fresh cherries, green corn, dew berries and black berries, grapes, lettuce, loganberries, onions and onion sets, peaches, peas, potatoes, fresh prunes, raspberries, spinach, strawberries, raspberries and watermelons.

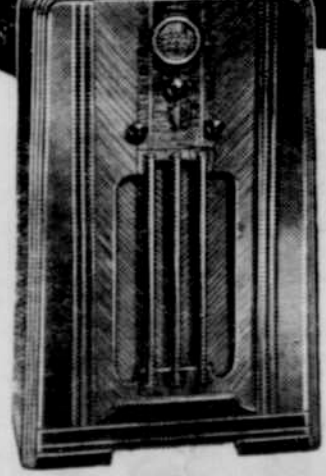
