## Train Kills Five

(Continued From Page One)

A speed between 35 and 40 miles an hour and the driver realized the grave danger, gave the car gas in an effort to clear the track. But it was too late, the right part of the engine front catching the right rear spring of the car and tossed the car into a crumbled heap clear of the track.

Those near the accident heard the woman scream as the engine smashed into the car, tossing all five of the people into the air. All were thrown clear of the train.

Train crew had already applied the brakes, turned sand onto the tracks and did everything to stop the train. The heavy freight, containing 69 cars came to a stop in 28 car lengths, according to testimony at the inquest by Engineer Erickson. This is a distance of approximately 1400 feet.

First ones at the scene of the wreck were Joe Hardin and Claude Marshall. Ted Nelson went for Dr. J. J. Sarazin. John Todd, who was standing near the depot at the time of the accident; E. J. Sheneberger, who was near the Amalgamated Sugar warehouse; A. L.

Hooper of Parma, in a car near the warehouse and Ike Boren, section foreman, all were at the accident in a matter of seconds.

Dr. Sarazin soon arrived, who sent for an ambulance and Mrs. Graham and Mrs. L. F. Buffington were rushed to the Holy Rosary Hospital in Ontario. Marshal A. V. Cook was the first officer at the accident, and Sgt. Chambers, Patrolmen Brittingham; Sheriff Glenn and Deputy Ievitt were there to help. Coroner R. A. Tacke and Dist. Attorney Biggs were notified and arrived a short time after the accident.

Three died before they could be moved and were later removed to the Nyssa Funeral Home, while Mrs. L. F. Buffington died a short time after being admitted to the Ontario hospital and Mrs. Graham early the following morning. Testimony at the inquest was to the effect that the boy had a fractured skull and broken back while Mrs. L. F. Buffington had a fractured thigh, fractured leg and internal injuries. The other three had severe skull injuries.

There was some difficulty in identifying the bodies of the victims as some false leads were encountered. The car license number gave a clue and a phone call to Payette disclosed the car was registered in the name of Daisy Marie Graham. Relatives were notified, who came during the morning to identify the victims.

Later in the day the two Mrs. Bufingtons were taken to Caldwell while Mrs. Graham, her son Eugene Thrash and Marion Kruger were all taken to Payette.
