## THRILL SHOW TO BE FEATURE AT FAIR GROUNDS SUNDAY

The Ontario post of the American Legion is sponsoring a "thrill show" at the fair grounds Sunday, May 23rd and are promising something unusual for the spectators. The blowing up of an automobile, showing exactly what will happen if a careless motorist throws cigarettes or matches around gasoline in service stations or other places. Blowing up of the auto will be shown as a special attraction of the Death Dodgers Circus and is sponsored by the American Legion and Safety Council.

The wrecking of the car, it was revealed, is in line with the National Safety Council's effort toward reducing auto fatalities and stresses the theme of the careless motorist. A \$200 sedan will be sacrificed in this feature with dynamite being planted in the car. A fully dressed dummy will be placed in the driver's seat and spectators will get a graphic picture which no words can describe. The act will take place at the far end of the fair grounds and all details are being handled by men who make this act a profession.
