

4-H Club Members To Leave June 6 For Summer School

Sunday, June 6th will be a gala day for some 35 Malheur County 4-H Club members and local leaders as this is the day when they entrain for the 1937 session of the annual 4-H Club Summer School at Corvallis.

Summer School this year will be from June 7th to 18th inclusive, which is immediately following the regular college session. Practically all of the club members and leaders attending this year recipients of scholarships provided by various organizations over the county. Annex P.T.A. is sending 1 member; Oregon Slope Grange, 1 member; Boulevard Grange, 1 member; Vale Grange, 2 members; Grove 4-H Clubs, 1 member; Oregon Trail P.T.A., 3 members; Owyhee P.T.A., 2 members; Wads P.T.A. 1 member; Jordan Valley P.T.A. 3 members; Kingman Colony 4-H Clubs, 2 members; and the Oregon Trail Pheasant Club, 1 member.

The Ontario Branch of the U. S. National Bank is giving a scholarship to the outstanding club boy or girl last year and the Eastern Oregon Observer is giving a scholarship to the winner in the News Writing contest. The Ontario Commercial Club is providing four summer school scholarships as is the Malheur County Fair Board.

The Malheur County 4-H Leaders' Council is sending three local leaders to this section and the Kingman Colony 4-H Clubs are providing a scholarship for one of their local leaders.

Although most of the delegation from this county will consist of scholarship winners, there will be a few who will be paying their own way to this session. The cost for the two weeks at Corvallis is twelve dollars for tuition, board and room, which takes care of all the necessary expenses. The railroad company offers a special round trip fare of seven dollars and sixty cents, making the total cost to the club member \$19.60 for the two weeks session.

Any regularly enrolled 4-H Club member is eligible to attend the summer school.
