It Happened In Nyssa Years Ago

Interesting bits of history gleaned from the files of years ago.

From The Gate City Journal June 1, 1937

Rex Brumbach, senior in vocational education at Oregon Agricultural College has been selected to membership in Phi Kappa Phi, national all-school honorary and the outstanding honorary on the campus. Brumbach is also a member of Kappa Phi Delta, education; a member of Kappa Delta Epsilon, national social fraternity, and Circle "O" association, athletic honorary for men. He is a regular on the soccer football and basketball team. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Brumbach of Big Bend. E. H. Jordan and J. W. Storie have been busy this week remodeling the front and installing a gasoline filling tank and other fixtures at the Sharp Bldg. Mr. Jordan will open a garage and will also handle Star cars.

Work on the road to the dam is being carried on extensively and promise of a good road in the near future is assured.

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Towne and Mrs. Eddie Powell will leave this week on a combined business and pleasure trip to Portland.

The Eastern Oregon Land Company and Oregon-Western Colonization Company, owners of the largest areas of land in the Vale and Owyhee irrigation districts, advised Wednesday that contracts for the sale of lands at the appraised value will be entered into with the government, thus removing another obstacle to the Owyhee project. The government has agreed to be sales agent without cost to the land owners.

Nyssa won from Star Sunday 8 to 6 in a game in which Felton Duncan got hit in the eye with the ball. At the time the score was 3 to 5 in favor of Star, but this changed the local's luck. Felton went ahead and finished the game with one eye, and onlookers said he played the same as when both optics were working.

At the meeting of the city council, J. Boydell resigned as city recorder and R. S. Megorden resigned as city marshal. P. A. Gallegly was appointed recorder and C. W. Reberger as city marshal at a salary of \$125 a month.

Miss Bessie Anderson is now the bookkeeper for the Nyssa Meat Market.

The first hay of the season was cut at the ranch of Dr. J. J. Sarazin and many others are now cutting hay, which is reported to be a good crop this year.

C. Allen Forbers, who has been attending school at the University of Oregon has returned home to assist with the farm work for the summer. He hopes to return to college again next year.

Fred Klingback, who recently sold his 65-acre ranch near Mitchell Butte to Wm. McNary of Bend, Oregon, for \$15,000 has purchased 80 acres from Ray Cantrall and will move onto it this week. The place is in crop but has no buildings. Mr. Klingback intends to build soon.

British Measurements

In Britain a cord of wood is 128 cubic feet; a chaldron of coal is equal to 85 pounds, a chest of cloves is 200 pounds, while a chest of tea is 84 pounds. A hoghead of tobacco is from 12 to 18 hundredweight; a mait of cloves is 80 pounds; a peck of flour equals 14 pounds, and a stone of meat, 8 pounds. A cran of herring equals 37½ gallons; a last of herring is 13,200 herrings, and a long hundred is equal to 33 warps, or 132 herrings.
