A SUMMARY OF THE YEARS WORK IN KINGMAN KOLONY PARENT-TEACHER GROUP.

"Character Growth, A Home and School Responsibility" has been the theme for studying Parent-Teacher Associations during the past year. This theme has been developed through the study of such characteristics as Friendliness, Forcefulness, Cooperativeness and Appreciation. With Mr. H. R. Otis for program chairman the Kolony unit has had as special subjects "Better English," "Peace Education" and "Juvenile Protection." Preceding each meeting the school children have entertained with a few samples of their school work. This has not been done by exploiting the individual child but by dramatized readings lessons or music. To introduce the subject of Juvenile Protection, the youngest patrol of Girl Scouts gave two safety plays.

Mr. Wylie Hewitt, Miss Joy Crummett and Miss Betty Nelson, the teachers, were complimented with a reception in September. This proved to be the first opportunity for many of our new residents to meet one another as well as the teachers. A jolly Halloween party was enjoyed in October.
