Boise—(Special)—Conclusion of the second term of Federal Residence School at Weiser, sponsored by the National Youth Administration, was announced this week by W. W. Gartin, Idaho state director. Seventy-one girls from Oregon and Idaho received attendance certificates at commencement exercises held June 22. Vernon L. Hudeison, assistant state director, was principal speaker.

"Two hundred and twenty-seven girls were provided with educational and work-training opportunities, otherwise not available to them during the last year," Gartin said. Under FRS planning, each enrollee is assigned to a work project for approximately two hours a day to help defray food and rental expenses, and miscellaneous costs of maintenance. From this employment each worker receives five dollars per month for her personal use. It was pointed out by the state director that all projects are of a practical and educational value, entailing such occupations as garment renovation, making of hospital supplies, visual aids for rural school use and divers other public assistance projects.

Class instruction in sewing, swimming, dramatics, English, infant care, personal hygiene, social science and allied subjects constitute the regular curriculum at the government school. Typing and shorthand were offered as extra curricula for students with experience, enabling practice continuance.

"The Idaho FRS, one of the fifty such schools established throughout the United States for unemployed young women eligible for NYA work project employment, is definitely beyond the experimental stage," the state director asserted. "Benefits derived by students have won recognition of state civic and youth leaders alike."

Girls from eastern Oregon participating in commencement exercises were: Vera Jensen, Miriam Jenkins, Ontario; Helen Hendrickson; Eva Kube, LaGrande; Emerald Padburg, Ione; Doris Bowman, Mable Bruce, Baker; Myrtle Brenton, Vale.

Application for continuance of the school next year has been submitted to Washington for approval.

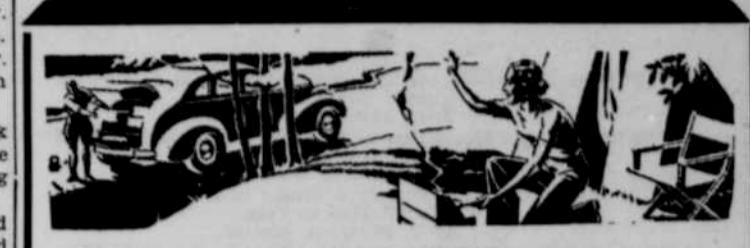
Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Gee and children, who have been here past ten days, left Wednesday for their home at Lead, South Dakota.
