RANKIN FEATURED STAR OF SKY CIRCUS



Tex Rankin, internationally famed stunt flier, who recently won the world competition for aerial acrobatics in St. Louis over a crack field of American and European aces, will be the featured stunting star of the Sky Circus of the 1937 Oregon Air Tour in ten cities in Oregon from July 2 to July 11, sponsored by the Oregon Aviation Development committee. He will use the same plane he used to win the championship of the world at St. Louis, an all-metal, low-wing monoplane built on his specifications. His part of the show will be a daring and thrilling half-hour exhibition of stunts, close to the ground, including the famed half-roll take-off in which he flips the ship over on its back as soon as it is 30 feet off the ground and then speeds upside down 30 feet from the ground before the crowd. Tex Rankin has been the featured ace at a dozen national and international air shows, including the National Air Races.
