P.T.A. CLINICS

During April and May ten Summer Round-Up Clinics were held in Malheur county. They were sponsored by the P. T. A. and various community clubs. One hundred sixty pre-school children were examined by doctors and dentists. Three hundred and seventy-six were examined all told.

The record of the pre-school children showed that: 89 had poor posture, 28 fair or poor, 91 showed good nutrition and general condition, 28 poor or fair, 85 had defective teeth; 17 had nasal defects not including adenoids; 93 had diseased tonsils and adenoids, some being emergency cases. Two had enlarged thyroid glands and 45 enlarged cervical glands. 8 had defects of the heart; 5 had hernia; 17 had feet defects; one, congested lungs; two serious nervous disorders; 10 deformed chest bones; one, anemia; one deformed extremities; 16 needed other special attention.

As a result of these clinics 4 children have had tonsils and adenoids removed; 11 applications have been sent to the Doernbecher Hospital; four are trying to get into the Shrine hospital at Portland; four chest X-rays have been taken; many children have been treated privately. The records show that only 21 of the 160 children had been immunized against smallpox; 29 against diphtheria. Five had had the Schick test and three the tuberculin test.

The clinic also found that 36 of the 160 had had scarlet fever; 1 diphtheria; 73 whooping cough; 84

measles; 57 chicken pox, 23 pneumonia 4 pleurisy; 11 bronchitis; 3 rheumatic fever; 3 chorea, 11 mumps; 1 typhoid; and 1 smallpox.
